**Mr. Bruce Falls Into His Tannery Vat.**

To the Editor of The Advance.

DEAR SIR—It is needless to reply to Mr. Bruce's letter concerning the Mill Co., as it is evident his sole topic is jealousy because he is not general manager and receptor of all benefits derived from the Co. His being a patron of the Co. seems to justify him in asking questions with regard to his property, which is only an equal right; but the fact of the matter is Mr. Bruce is an enemy in disguise to our Co., and has blindly fought against his own financial interests. He did his utmost to prevent the establishment of the company because he was selling flour manufactured in adjoining mills, and realizing a profit of 50 cts. per bbl. and upward, but since his flour trade is annihilated, and now he is clamoring for a commission of 45 cts. per bbl. for disposing of our flour which literally sell for nothing. Then I am commanding great salary for my trouble because I received \$2.00 for drawing the rolls to the

station which a gentleman better experienced in that line than either he or I asked \$2.25 for. The rolls weigh 1500 lbs. His statement "Mr. Pearsoll is authorized to sell proceeds of the mill without an order," is erroneous, because I being a director know such is not the case. Mr. Pearsoll was never instructed by the board of directors or even the majority of them so to do. How foolish for me to have been replying to Mr. Bruce's queries, as he has apparently not been writing for information beneficial to himself, he being superintendent of the Sunday school, local preacher, and an expert at things not so creditable. His character cannot be exposed to risk, as he can glide through a sea of fallacy like a seal in an Arctic sea, and distort truth with as much celerity as Paddy can a hay rope, as is verified in his statement in his last epistle when he says "I made the first charge against him." Because he smeared himself over in his own tannery he tried to drag me through the four mill.

A RIPE OLD AGE.—Last Friday night Mr. Samuel Horton, sr., died at the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. Wm. McCracken, Scrope St., at the ripe old age of 82 years. The deceased was born in the town of Brockville in 1810, and was a resident of Eastern Ontario for many years. He came to Owen Sound 36 years ago, and from that time until his death was an esteemed citizen of the town. He was an extensive contractor, and completed many large contracts in different parts of Canada, among which might be mentioned the building of the G. T. Railroad from Toronto to Montreal and the London and Goderich gravel roads. Mr. Horton has been for many years a staunch member of the Methodist church. He celebrated the 60th anniversary of his wedding last year. His wife still survives him. The other surviving relatives are his brother, Mr. T. B. Horton, of Owen Sound, and his children; Mr. Samuel Horton, of Derby; Capt. Abraham Horton, of Idaho; Mr. N. P. Horton, of Owen Sound; Mrs. Knight, of Belleville; Mrs. Jas. Brown, of Derby, and Mrs. McCracken, of Owen Sound. The funeral took place to Greenwood Cemetery Sunday afternoon, and was well attended despite the wet weather.—[O. S. Advertiser.]

Up to Saturday there had been 17,157 cases of cholera and 7,339 deaths in Hamburg.

A British man-of-war has been ordered to Vladivostok, Siberia, to look into the recent outrages by Russians on Canadian sealers.
