**The Best Fair Held in Flesherton for Many a Year**

East Grey fall fair was blessed this year with exceedingly fine, mild weather, an exceptionally fine turnout, and a very satisfactory exhibit. Our predictions of a week ago were fulfilled to the letter. Between twelve and fifteen hundred people entered the gate Friday, and it is safe to say that not one went away disappointed with the afternoon's amusement. The hall was better filled than it ever was before, and the contents were much admired by all beholders.

With one exception everything went off like clock work. That exception was in the speeding contest, when Mr. McDeavit, of Dundalk, broke his sulky in the last round and was thrown to the ground. He sustained no injuries, however. The township exhibits were a source of much attraction and judging was a laborious matter, as the result was decided by points.

Messrs. McKnight of Owen Sound and McCullough of Dundalk were judges on fruit. Mr. McKnight expressed himself as much surprised at the amount and quality of fruit shown. He did not think this section of Grey capable of raising such magnificent fruits. Therein he was agreeably disappointed.

Mr. R. Gilray of Euphrasia, and Mr. Ruthvan of Collingwood, showed some splendid peaches grown by them. These were surprisingly large and fine fruit.

Messrs. Burk and Barrett showed two handsome colts got by Whiteoak's thoroughbred King James.

The two bicycle races were something new and taking. Two young gentlemen from Meaford competed against one of our town boys, with results as given in the prize list.

All events came off as advertised, and the afternoon was unalloyed with disappointment.

In the lady driver classes much comment was made upon the nobby and neat turnouts. Those who handled the ribbons, and handled them to perfection were Miss Lizzie Stewart, Mrs. R. McGirr, Mrs. J. Teeter, Miss Emma Damude and Miss McDuff. We should not have cared to be judge, they all looked and did so well.

Mr. T. F. Harrison, of Dundalk, had a neat little tent on the ground in which he exhibited three handsome organs and one of ye olden tyme melodeons of ancient pattern. Mr. Harrison is agent in these parts for the Dominion organ, two of which he had on exhibition. The Dominion is a capital organ and Mr. Harrison is a pushing energetic salesman, and a gentleman to whom we are pleased to recommend our readers. He is also agent for the Doherty organ.

At the concert in the evening the inimitable Jimmie Fax and Miss Pringle, of Toronto, attracted a house crowded almost to suffocation. Mr. Fax is—well, everybody knows what Fax is. Miss Pringle has a very sweet, pure soprano voice, and thrilled her audience with pretty melodies perfectly rendered. Should Miss Pringle ever return to Flesherton she will receive a warm welcome.
