Ontario farmers, though suffering severely through damages to crops sustained by wet weather, have still much to be thankful for. Despatches from England inform us that English farmers are in a deplorable condition, and there is, it is claimed, a crisis in agriculture in the old land. A large number of farms are being given up all over the country, and it is thought new tenants cannot be got.

Lord Alfred Tennyson, the "sweet singer of Aldworth," died at his home on Thursday last in his 84th year. Wherever the English language is spoken, there Lord Tennyson's beautiful creations are known. From our earliest years such poems as "The May Queen," "Locksley Hall" and the "Lady of Shalott" have been familiar. Tennyson was a prince among poets, and, we believe, the greatest of his age.

Count Mercier is at present travelling through deep waters. He has been sent up for trial on a number of charges of malfeasance of office, or in other words stealing public money and using it for private gratification. On Monday Mr. Laurier, the Liberal leader of the Dominion, sat at Le Count's right hand and gave the support of his presence. It is said that attempts are being made to balk justice in this matter. Let us hope, in the name of all that is pure, that these attempts will not prove successful.

The enormous traffic of the great lakes may be realized from the following figures. During the season of 1890, the Detroit Flats Canal and the "Soo" Canal were open for navigation 228 days, and the Suez Canal for 365 days. The total tonnage which passed through these channels was:

Suez Canal...	6,500,500
"Soo" Canal...	8,454,435
Detroit River...	21,684,229

And the average tonnage per diem:

	Tons per day.
Suez Canal...	18,870
"Soo" Canal...	37,180
Detroit River...	59,106

It thus appears that the average daily business of the "Soo" Canal is twice as great, and of the Detroit river five times as great as the traffic of the Suez canal. Almost the entire volume of this tonnage sails under the United States flag. Canadians having a mere fractional share thereof. The tonnage passing through the "Soo" Canal is of course of a different character from that passing through the Suez; it is not so important ton for ton.—[Montreal Witness.

The autumn landscape is now something superb. The forest is clothed with a wealth of color which no artist could portray and no pen properly describe. This tinting and blending of nature's brush is one of Canada's greatest beauties, for nowhere else in the world does nature lavish more bountifully her beautiful coloring than is to be found in Ontario when the maple, beech and oak are clothed in rainbow tints. Just now it is one of sublime beauty and would repay a drive of many miles. We verily believe there is nothing handsomer in the world. Artemesia Council.

Artemesia Council met in the Town Hall on Monday, 3rd inst., with all members present, the Reeve in the chair. Communications were read from Mr. Wm. Irwin, asking Council to protect dangerous places in sidewalk; from J. C. Black, re expenditure on Town Line Artemesia and Glenelg; and from Messrs. Wright & Lindsay, barristers, re Thos. Taylor's claim for work done on road. Accounts were presented from W. H. Thurston, printing tax collector's receipts, \$6.50; W. J. Bellamy, quarter's salary, \$37.50; John Bellamy, care of Town Hall, \$5.75; S. Osborne, fencing gravel pit, \$1.00; S. Fisher, building bridge \$15.

Moved by Messrs Kells and Damude, that the communication of Mr. W. Irwin be acknowledged and the pathmasters be instructed to place necessary guards or hand rails on the portion of sidewalk referred to, also on the portion of sidewalk opposite the residence of Mr. John McKee, on Collingwood street, the cost of same to be chargee commutation fund of Flesherton village for the year 1893. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Damude and Kells, that the commissioner of ward No. 3 be and is hereby instructed to repair hill opposite Mr. I. Sinclair's place on 140 side road. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Kells and McMillan, that the Reeve and Mr. Pedlar be a committee to examine that portion of road east and west of bridge over Beaver river between lot 24, con. 13, and lot 24, con. 14 with a view to have said road made passable. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Kells and McMillan, that the Reeve and Mr. Damude be a Committee to report on By Law 488 at next meeting of council. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Kells and Pedlar, that the communication from the council of Glenelg giving a statement of expenditure on town line Artemesia and Glenelg this council cannot give the Township of Glenelg credit for the expenditure of statute labor be credited Artemesia. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Kells and McMillan, that the claim of Thos. Taylor, through his solicitors Wright & Lindsay, for \$6, resolved that this Council has paid all they have a just right to pay in this matter and will therefore pay no more. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. McMillan and Damude, that the following accounts be paid and the Reeve issue his order for same: John Bellamy, caretaker of Hall, \$3.75; W. J. Bellamy, \$37.50; W.

Thurston, tax collectors' receipts, \$6.50. Moved by Messrs. Kells and McMillan, that Samuel Osborn be paid \$1.00 for fencing pit on con. 12, in front of lot 17. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Pedlar and Damude that the Reeve issue orders in favor of the following parties for road work: Henry Fenwick \$24.75, Joseph Pedlar \$5.25. Charge special grant on 25 side road and John O'Brien \$6.00 on townline Artemesia and Euphresia. Mr. Fisher, for building bridge opposite lot 32, con 4, Artemesia, \$15.50. Carried. Council adjourned.
