Burglary.

Burglars appear to be out in force in this county, and most of the towns and villages have lately received visits from these gentry. Flesherton's turn came on Wednesday night of last week, when Mr. M. R. Richardson's hardware store was entered and about fifteen dollars' worth of goods taken, including four or five pounds of gunpowder. The thieves then adjourned to the postoffice, where an unsuccessful attempt was made to blow open the safe. A hole was drilled through it, but at this point their drill appears to have broken and remained in the hole, thus foiling the rascals. None of the villagers saw or heard anything out of the way, and the thieves escaped without an alarm being raised, but with precious little booty. It appears that they then drove out to the station, entered the school house there and warmed themselves. On the following night, Thursday, Mr. Hill's store in Markdale was burglarized, about twenty-five dollars worth of stuff being taken.
