The Rev. Woodger reviewed the Sabbath school on the Oct. lessons last Sunday.

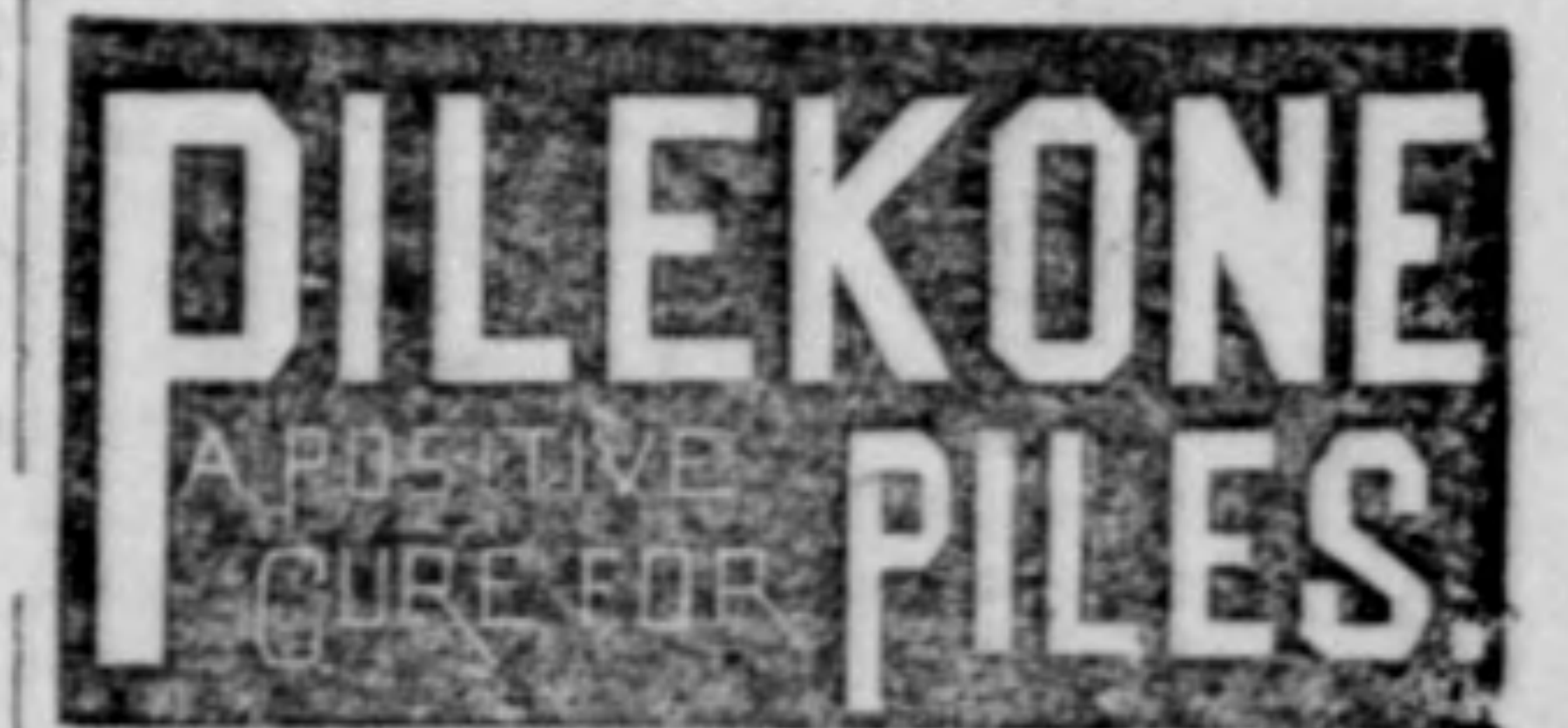
Mr. H. Little, of Owen Sound, gave his brother a call last Friday and remained till Monday.
