SCHEDULED CATTLE.

England has scheduled Canadian cattle, which simply means that Canada has been placed upon the same footing that the United States has hitherto been with regard to the cattle trade. It means that in future all cattle sent from Canada must be slaughtered immediately upon arrival in England and not allowed to roam at large and fatten on English hay. They will hereafter be obliged to fatten on Canadian fodder before embarking for Europe, and deliver up their hides and "taller" as soon as they touch the sacred soil of England, after the manner of the Jews who bared their feet before entering the temple. It is claimed that this will eventually be a blessing instead of a blow to the Canadian farmer, as the increased price of fattening will remain in the country. We do not agree with this view. Hitherto scrub cattle have commanded a good sale. These were shipped to Scotch and north of England farmers, who completed the process of fattening and reaped the profits. The new move will bar out that class of cattle, and in this way it will no doubt be a hardship to many farmers who are obliged to sell the poor with the good. It will also probably have the effect of lessening the number of buyers in this country and in that way lower the price. It will no doubt leave more money in the hands of the capitalist who can purchase largely and fatten, and not with the poor farmer who will be obliged to sell at what figure he can get. We are not of opinion with many papers that this scheduling business is a blessing in disguise—far from it. However, the matter must be taken philosophically. It will work a revolution in the cattle trade, which has been of so much importance to this country during late years. It will partially kill it for the time being, although it may again in a year or two attain respectable proportions. If it were not conceded to be a heavy blow to this country why should our government officials and those interested have put forth such energetic efforts to prevent the catastrophe? The truth of the matter is that these new regulations have placed a large branch of Canadian trade in a pretty bad hole, and we will have to climb out as best we can. We have the satisfaction of knowing that our officials did all that lay in their power to prevent it, and we have the poor satisfaction of knowing, too, that this inexcusable and unfriendly act was perpetrated by the government of one who used to be called with respect, but now in derision, the Grand Old Man.

Mercier and Pacaud have been acquitted in Quebec. This result is only what has been anticipated during the trial, owing to the nature of the defence, the personnel of the jury and an existing feeling that Mr. Mercier has already been humiliated to such an extent that conviction could have added to his cup very little more punishment. It is quite possible that

he may prey upon this generous feeling by the martyr act, for the tumble has not apparently caved in his colossal cheek. It is even said that he will take his seat in parliament and head the Quebec Liberals once more—if they will let him. Whether they do allow him or not, he evidently does not intend that the country shall forget him, more's the pity.
