**Artemesia Council.**

Council met in the Town Hall on Monday last, all the members present, the reeve in the chair. Communications were received from the clerk of Proton township re monies expended on town line; from Alex. Brown, re the matter of Mrs. Dougald McMillan, who, according to this letter, has been used very hardly by her relatives and left in impecunious circumstance. Messrs. Kells and Pedlar presented report of committee appointed to examine road deviation between lot 24 in the 13th con., and lot 24 in the 14th, recommending payment to John Weber of \$30 for bridging and ditching. Mr. Damude presented report of expenditure in Ward No. 3 since last meeting, as follows: Repairing stone culvert at D. McKenzie's, John Wright, \$2.50; Alex. Stewart, \$2.00; cement, 30 cents; I. Sinclair, repairing hill and gaveling on 140 sideroad, \$3.50; W. Davis, job on gravel road, \$18.96; culvert on gravel road at Flesherton station, J. O'Melia, \$6.58. It was

Moved by S. Damude, seconded by D. McMillan, that the following accounts be paid and the reeve issue his cheque in favor of the several parties named: M. Richardson, reeve, W. McLaughrey, assessor, and W. J. Bellamy, clerk, \$4 each for selecting jurors; D. McDonald, repairing Priceville bridge, \$4; John Bellamy, wood and coal oil for hall, \$5.37; Jos. Aussum, repairing bridge, Durham road, \$3.25; Thos. Taylor, repairing scrapers, 95c.; John Bellamy, lamp for hall, \$6; D. Clayton, two leather bags for collectors, \$4.25.

Kells—McMillan—That part of the town line, Artemesia and Proton, now reported by Messrs. Best and Bannan as being unfit for travel, be referred to Mr. Damude with instructions to make necessary repairs, expenditure not to exceed \$20.—Carried.

Kells—McMillan.—That report of committee on deviation between lot 24, con. 13, and lot 24, con. 14, be adopted and the reeve issue his order for payment.—Carried.

Kells—McMillan.—That the grant of two dollars to Mrs. McMillan by the reeve be paid and that he be instructed to make full enquiry into her circumstances and grant such further relief as may be necessary and report to next meeting of this council.—Carried.

McMillan—Pedlar.—That the costs of loan for September, amounting to nine dollars, be paid and the reeve issue order for same.

Damude—Pedlar.—That all previous motions and resolutions passed by this council, offering rewards for the apprehension and conviction of incendiaries, be and are hereby rescinded, and this council in future deal in each separate case as the circumstances may require.—Carried.

Damude—McMillan.—That this council be now adjourned to meet on the 15th day of December next.—Carried.

**Division Court.**

There was a heavy docket at the Division Court which was held in the Town Hall before Judge Morrison on Thursday last. No less than seven lawyers conducted business before the court, but even with all this assistance the business was not completed and court had to be adjourned until the 18th inst., some eight or nine cases, all brought by the Toronto General Trusts Company against debtors to the late Mr. Williams, of Maxwell, being held over until that date. The cases disposed of were as follows:

Neilson v. Wauchob.—Action on account: Former judgment set aside and verdict given against Thos Wauchob for \$19.82 with costs, and against Samuel Wauchob for \$3.75. I. B. Lucas for plaintiff, J. W. Frost for defendant.

Johnston v. Dean.—This was a case where J. J. Johnston, of Meaford, sued C. F. Dean on promissory note. Goods had been seized in execution, but were claimed by defendant's wife, Mary A. Dean, who attempted to show that these goods had been purchased by her out of money paid her by Dean as dowry. Judgment for execution creditor and against the claimant, Mary A. Dean. Hatton, of Meaford, for plaintiff, I. B. Lucas for defendant.

Wright v. C. P. R.—Suit brought by Thorp Wright against defendant to recover overcharges and deductions in weight. The amount claimed was \$17.46. Of this amount defendants had paid into court \$5.96, but without costs, and stood suit on two items for demurrage and shunting. Judgment for plaintiff for \$5.96 and the costs. Wright & Lindsay for plaintiff, McMurchy for defendants.

McEwards v. Moodie, Lakings garnishee.—No one appearing for plaintiff case was nulsit.

Graham & Co. v. Fawcett.—Action on account for \$62.80. The parties live in Dundalk. Judgment for plaintiff for full amount and costs.

Graham & Co. v. Wellwood, Harrison garnishee.—Withdrawn as against garnishee, judgment primary debtor for amount of claim.

Little v. Crombie, Cobn garnishee.—Interpleader. The parties live near Wareham. Crombie had given chattel mortgage on certain grain, which had been seized at the instance of the holder. The lawyer for the defence held that the seizure was an illegal one, and the case was adjourned to hear argument in Owen Sound on Monday.

Worrall v. Hannah.—Garnishee case. Adjourned until next court.

Miss Christy Morrison, of Sydenham, was married last week to Mr. Albert Fleming, of Derby. Miss Morrison, it will be remembered, was the only survivor of the ill-fated Asia that went down in the Georgian Bay ten years ago.—[Mirror.]
