**THE AMERICAN ELECTION.**

Our statement last week that Cleve-land had swept the country has, by later despatches, been more than verified. His victory at the polls has been quite as decided as was that of the last Conservative victory in this country. This will give all Canadians, irrespective of party, a tingling sensation of joy. Not that we may look for important favors from Mr. Cleveland's administration, but his policy has been one of a more conciliatory nature than that of Harrison. It will please the Conservative party, because they felt that Mr. Harrison was playing into the hands of Canada's enemies and following the advice of traitor spies who guided the operations from Toronto and directed where the blows should be aimed. It will also gratify all fair-minded Reformers who care an atom for the welfare of their country, and those of a deeper political stripe will be pleased simply because of Mr. Cleveland's more moderate fiscal policy. Altogether Canadians, although they have no direct interest at stake, will rejoice as a man at the overthrow of one who has dealt so unfairly with them.

In this connection may we not hazard an opinion upon the result which has not yet been noted: We are told that during several years past thousands of Canadians have made their homes in the northern and western states and become citizens of the republic. May it not be that the lingering sympathies of these have acted as a leaven in the overthrow of the Republican party? The great upheaval has been in these northern and western states, where ex-Canadians are numerous and Canadian and American interests comparatively parallel. If this be the case Canada is safe from the infliction of grievous harm by any administration which may in future control the treasury benches to the south of us, and the exodus referred to may be regarded as not altogether void of good results.

The Globe clips with applause from a Philadelphia paper an item which says: "Responsible journalism does not bluff or deceive." The Globe should stereotype that sentiment and keep it standing at head of the editorial column, until next general election, so that it may not forget itself as heretofore. The Globe knows what shattered hopes and unmasked bluffing is by many a bitter experience.

**Osprey Council.**

Osprey council met in the Orange Hall at Singhampton on Oct. 24th last, members all present, reeve in chair, minutes of last meeting read and signed. Communications were read from John Paul, bill of \$12, coffin and funeral expenses for Wm. Green. Council considered this bill excessive and tendered Mr. Paul \$8.00 as a full settlement; from Robert Beatty, indigent, asking aid. A petition was presented by Mr. Allan Bell, signed by a number of rate-

payers on con. 14, asking council to repair townline of Collingwood and Osprey, opposite lots 85 and 87. The commissioner of Div. No. 4 was instructed to write to the commissioner of Collingwood regarding repairing the same; from Thos. Stephens, inspector of trees, report for 1892 and bill of \$10 for services; from Samuel Taylor, assessor, bill \$8, fees and mileage, equalizing union school sections.

By-law No. 801 authorizing the Treasurer to pay county rate and school moneys for 1892, received its several readings and became law.

Orders were issued on the Treasurer to pay as follows. Thos. Stephens, \$10, inspecting trees; Samuel Taylor, \$8, equalizing union school sections; the Clerk, \$6, and the Reeve and Assessor, \$4 each, selecting jurors for 1893; J. Paul, \$8, coffin and funeral expenses for Wm. Green; Robt. Beatty, indigent, 2; the reeve, \$5, expenses re Thornbury bridge; the Clerk, \$8, preparing statement for arbitrators, re Thornbury bridge.

Council adjourned to meet at Feversham on December 15th next.

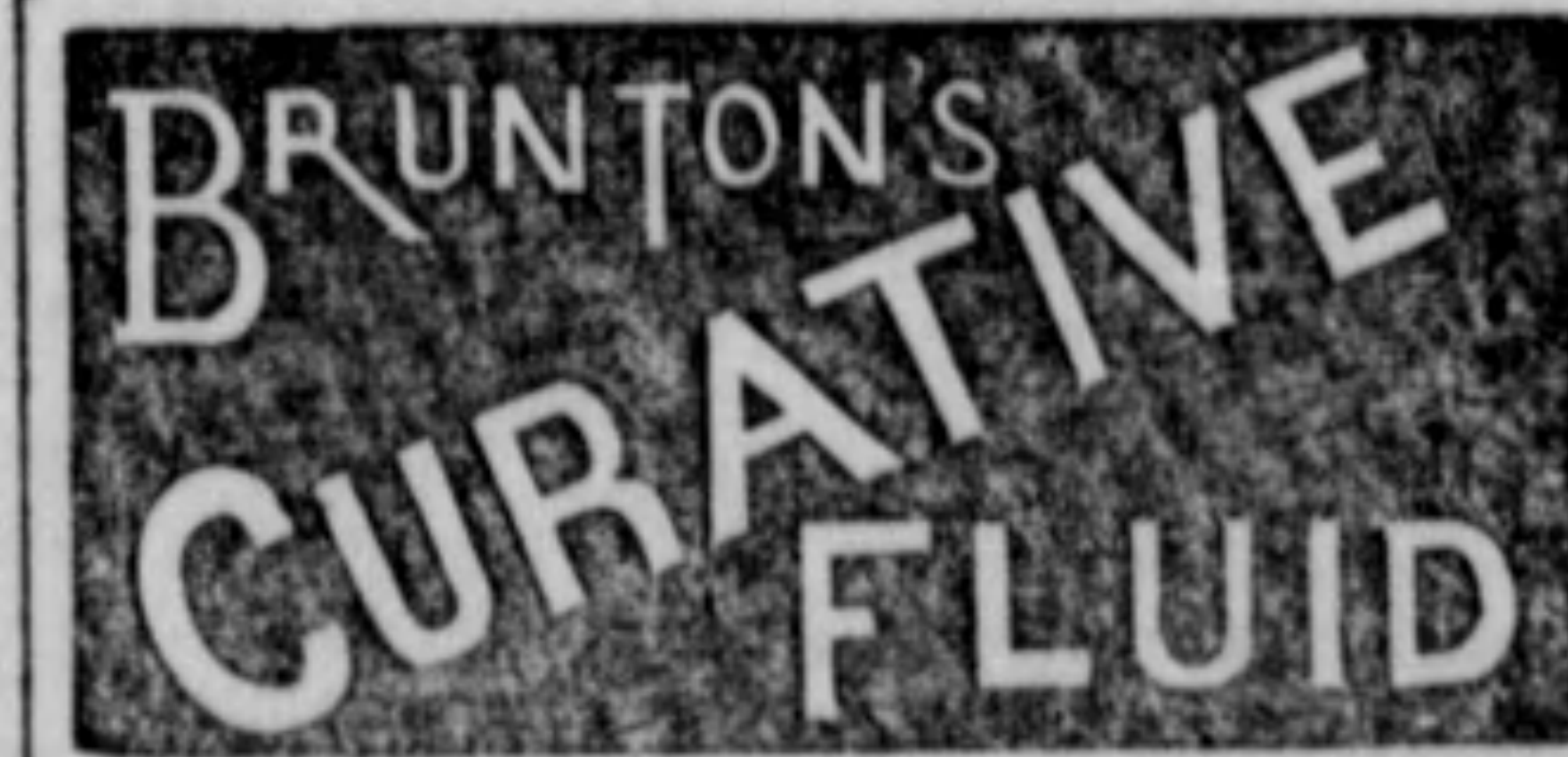
