A complete list of representatives in the Congress just elected on the other side, made up from returns received by the Democratic National Committee and compared with those received by the Clerk of the House, show that the Democrats have elected 252 members, the Republicans 125 and the Peoplists 7, giving the Democrats a majority of 90.
