SOMETHING DEFINITE.

The ADVANCE is glad to announce
this week that Mr. M. Richardson,
Esq. will once more be a candidate
for the reeveship of this township.
It has been very generally circulated
that he purposed retiring from the
council board owing to pressure of
business, and in fact he had thought
of doing so, but recent developments
at the County Council have caused
him to re-consider the question. It
is unnecessary for us to refer here to
these, as Mr. Richardson will explain
matters fully to the electors in due
time. We will say, though, knowing
how affairs stand, that we have no
hesitation in deciding that Mr. Rich-
ardson should be returned by acclama-
tion. Extraneous of the matters
which have persuaded Mr. Richardson
to offer himself once more, we wish
to say, on our own authority, but
from certain knowledge, that there is
no man more respected, and no man
more honored at the County Council
than Mr. Richardson. Artemesia does
itself honor by sending such a man,
and should consider itself fortunate
in Mr. Richardson's decision to offer
himself once more as a servant of the
people.

In ward 4 it is the present expecta-
tion that Mr. Thompson will "stand
to his guns" against Mr. Pedlar, and
in ward 2 Mr. McCormack's name is
spoken of as an opponent to Mr. Kells.
We have heard of no opposition being
in the field against Mr. McMillan or
Mr. Dannde. The Patrons have not
yet fully decided what they will do,
but now that Mr. Richardson has an-
nounced himself they will no doubt
find the matter easier to adjust.
The old councillors will all seek re-
election.

Sir John Thompson has succeeded
in completing his cabinet, which will
be composed of the following gentle-
men:—Prime Minister and Minister
of Justice—Sir John S. D. Thompson.
Minister of Public Works—Hon. J.
A. Ouhmet. Minister of Trade and
Commerce—Hon. Mackenzie Bowell.
Minister of Railways and Canals—
Hon. John Haggart. Minister of
Militia—Hon. J. G. Patterson. Min-
ister of Agriculture—Hon. A. R.
Angers. Secretary of State—Hon.
John Costigan. Minister of Finance
—Hon. G. E. Foster. Minister of
Marine and Fisheries—Hon. C. H.
Tupper. Postmaster General—Sir
Adolphe P. Caron. Minister of the
Interior—Hon. T. M. Daly. Presi-
dent of the Council—W. B. Ives.
Without Portfolio—Hon. Frank
Smith and Sir John Caldwell Abbott.
The three portfolios without a seat
in the Cabinet are placed as follows—
Solicitor-General—Mr. Curran.
Comptroller of Inland Revenue—J. P.
Wood. Comptroller of Customs—
Mr. Clark Wallace.

There died last week in New York
a sixty-times millionaire, in the per-
son of Jay Gould. Sixty millions of
the earth's wealth he accumulated
and hoarded as his own, by methods
that beggared hundreds of his fellow
beings. He was a successful finan-
cier, and to what end? To the end
simply that he might become the
richest man in America. But he
failed in that. In what did he gain?

His lips are silent, he has gone to his
reward, his millions are left behind,
forgotten; and the world profits by
his death. Men speak hard things of
him; say he never did a humane act,
say he was entirely selfish, and that
money was his god. What a terrible
arraignment! What a life, and what
a death! How forcibly that little text
of Scripture, with which we all are
familiar, presents itself.

Messrs Richardson and Kells were
successful in getting the necessary
by-law passed at County council last
week adding an extra hundred acres
to this village and providing for its
formation into a police village. The
necessary election of "commissioners"
will be held in conjunction with the
other municipal election, providing
there are more than three nominated.

Principal Grant on Sir John
Thompson.

Principal Grant, of Queen's College, in
an interview, spoke as follows with re-
gard to the elevation of Sir John
Thompson to the Premiership:—After
stating that Sir John was the only man
who could have been called in to form a
Ministry, and that during the last two
sessions he proved he knew how to lead,
the principal said: "Sir John is a true
Canadian, a friend of British connection,
a man of undoubted purity in private life,
one whom the office has sought instead
of his seeking the office, and whose whole
character, as well as his life as a judge,
must make him strongly in favor of
gathering round him men of integrity and
ability. If the constituencies have no
able men to send, or decline to send
them, it is unfair to blame a Premier be-
cause he selects second-rate men."

In referring to Sir John's religion the
principal said: "The men whom Protest-
ants most honor were brought up in the
Roman Catholic church, and they exer-
cised the ordinary rights of reason and
conscience when they protested against
what they believed to be abuses in the
church. How, then, can we deny to any
man the right to leave one church for
another that he may consider better?
When we do that we cease to be Protest-
ants. Sir John is an honest man
in the opinion of those who have known
him longest and most intimately. If he
allowed his church connection to influence
his political action in any matter he
would be dishonest. As to the effect of
his change on the mind of others, that,
of course, is a question that cannot be
answered positively. There are Protest-
ant bigots and Roman Catholic bigots.
I think, for instance, if Mr. Chapleau
turned Protestant, Quebec would not
welcome him very cordially as a govern-
or; or that if Mr. Laurier turned Pro-
testant, he would not have his present
following from the province of Quebec.
Why, then, should we wonder if there
are some Protestants so ignorant as to
object to Sir John Thompson on the
ground of his being a convert. I should
hope for our credit that there are not
many such. Of course, he will be
watched very closely for the next two
or three years, and a glorious opportunity
is given him of showing to Canadians that
Catholics can be as free from clerical dicta-
tion in political matters as Protestants.
It is a good thing to trust men, especially
when they have shown themselves worthy
of trust. We should not forget that the
admiral appointed by Queen Elizabeth
to meet the Grand Armada of Spain was
a Roman Catholic. He was, however, an
Englishman first and a Roman Catholic
second. Every man in public life in this
country must be a Canadian, first, last
and all the time. Sir John Thompson
knows that as well as any man, and he
would not have taken the office had he
not felt that he could take it as a free
man. I am inclined to think that he
will be tested on the Manitoba school
question by the people more than on any
other. We could not check Quebec on
the Jesuit estates question. Men who
felt that the Act was bad in itself and in-
sulting in form, opposed the Parliament
of Canada interfering with it on the
ground of provincial rights. Substantially
on the same ground we cannot
check Manitoba. I do not know whether
the Roman Catholics of Manitoba have
been hardly dealt with in the recent legis-
lation or not, but, if they have, the
appeal must be taken to the people of
Manitoba themselves. Any attempt to
coerce Manitoba from outside would
rouse such a spirit in the province as
would effectually prevent remedial
measures for half a century, and would
also rouse such a spirit in the other pro-
vinces that compromises, which are now
accepted and which are working satis-
factorily, would very likely be swept
away, and bitter feelings thereby engen-
dered that would sadly hinder our
unification as a people."
