Artemesia Council.

The final meeting for this year of Artemesia township Council was held in the Town Hall on Monday last, with all the members present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. A communication was read from L. Hutton re damage to vehicle at Flesherton Station. James Butler waited on the Council, asking refund of taxes on account of fire to barn. Bylaws Nos. 486, appointing deputy returning officers, and 487, re renting of Town Hall, were introduced and passed their several stages.

Moved by Messrs. Damude and McMillan, that the clerk be paid five dollars for preparing statement, affidavits, etc., in connection with the Thornbury bridge arbitration, as per bill rendered. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Damude and McMillan, that the following bills be paid and the Reeve issue his cheque for the same: Mrs. Thompson for bread for Mrs. Hanley, \$4; J. & W. Boyd, for repairing Saugeen bridge, \$1; D. W. Jamieson, gravel, \$1; corporation of Markdale, rent of hall for Division Court, \$6; Richardson's drug store, stationery for clerk, \$2.76. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Damude and McMillan, that Mr. G. Latimer's account as health officer, amounting to \$5, be paid, and the Reeve issue his cheque for the same. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Kells and Damude, that William Carter be paid \$5 for removing timber off base line, lot 12, con. 2 east, and that John McGee be paid \$1 for repairing bridge over Saugeen river, lot 18, con. 11. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Pedlar and Damude, that the Reeve issue cheques in favor of trustees of the several school sections in the township for amount of trustees' school rates in said sections, also cheques for proportion of township school rates to each section entitled to the same. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Kells and McMillan, that the communication from Mr. Lincoln Hutton, re damage to buggy, be laid over until further information be obtained. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Kells and Damude, that Mrs. Smith, an indigent, be paid four dollars a month while circumstances require said payment, and that the Reeve issue his order for payment monthly until further advised. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Damude and McMillan, that Geo. Ludlow's bill for repairing culvert on Town Line, Artemesia and Proton, amounting to \$2, be paid, and the Reeve issue his cheque for the amount. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Kells and Pedlar, that the account of D. McTavish, of \$18, for work done under him as pathmaster, and by direction of Council, be paid, and be made a charge on the statute labor account of the village of Flesherton for 1893. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Kells and McMillan, that James Butler be refunded his taxes, amounting to \$6.48, he having suffered by having his barn burned in the present year, 1892, and that the Reeve issue his order for payment. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. McMillan and Damude, that the following bills be paid for special work performed by commissioners of Wards 1, 2, 3 and 4, as follows: Ward 1, \$15; Ward 2, \$30.60; Ward 3, \$19.57; Ward 4, \$10; the Reeve, \$2. Carried.

Moved by Messrs. Pedlar and Damude, that as the collectors' of rates for 1892 have failed to collect all the taxes on their several rolls by the time named by this Council, viz., 14th Dec., 1892, be it resolved that said collectors be, and they are hereby authorized to, continue the levy and collection of said unpaid taxes in the manner and with the powers provided by law for the general levy and collection of taxes up to the fifteenth day of January, 1893, but nothing contained in this resolution shall alter or affect the duty of said collectors to return their rolls or in any manner invalidate or affect the liabilities of said collectors sureties. Carried.

The Reeve was requested to vacate the chair and Mr. Pedlar requested to take the same when the following motion was put and unanimously carried by standing vote.

Moved by Messrs. Damude and McMillan, that the Reeve receive a vote of thanks from this Council for the able and impartial manner in which he has presided over this Council for the past year. Carried.—[Council adjourned.]
