A despatch from Ottawa says that Dr. Sproule, of East Grey has taken prompt action as chairman of the Committee on Agriculture in one of the most important matters now before the Canadian public, that of the scheduling of Canadian cattle in England. He has put upon the notice paper a motion for all the correspondence and documents relating to the case, which will give him the English side of the case. At the same time he intends to ask authority to call before the committee representative veterinarians and others to show that pleuro-pneumonia has never existed in Canada, and that with our present quarantine regulations it would be impossible for the disease to obtain a foothold. Backed by this he will ask the House to pass a resolution presenting the case to the notice of the imperial authorities, with good hopes that the facts thus collated may lead to the rescinding of the obnoxious regulations. The matter could

not be in more capable hands than those of the energetic chairman of the Committee on Agriculture.
