posed of Messrs. Gilray, Armstrong and the mover.

Mr. Gilray then moved, seconded by Mr. Clark, that the Warden and Mr. Read be a deputation to advocate the repeal of sec. 533, A consolidated municipal Act of 1892, before the municipal committee of the local Legislature.

Mr. Boland thought it might be as well to wait until the other counties were heard from, as it would be better to have concerted action.

Mr. Gilray said the other counties were moving and were pretty evenly divided on the subject. The question was before the Legislature last session and would be decided this session, and now if ever was the time to act.

Mr. Agnew said the hour was too late to introduce such a motion (it being almost eleven) He agreed with the reeve of Owen Sound that the minority had a right to representation and proposed if a deputation were sent that it include two advocates for repeal, and one against. (laughter.)

Mr. Clark said the local members advised sending a deputation. It would be an evidence to the government that the council were in earnest. Numerous petitions went before the house last year for and against repeal, according as the interest of the counties varied. Counties which have large rivers running through them mostly find the provision to their interest, but to a county situated like Grey it is an injury and a wrong. In his township of Keppel there were no large bridges over streams, but they had rocks to overcome that were equally expensive. In one place they had a bridge of 80 bents to get over a rock. Other townships had miles of swamp to be cross-wayed, yet could claim no assistance. Then outside the question of injustice there were defects in the Act. It had too many ifs, leading to different interpretations, which in turn led to expensive arbitrations as the county had lately experienced. If the arbitrators in the Thornbury matter had exacted all the evidence the law provided for from the municipalities the expense would have run up into thousands of dollars. Ex-coeves and deputies who have removed to Minnesota and the North-west would have had to be summoned to give evidence.

Mr. Sing moved to adjourn till next morning, but was voted down.

Mr. Shute was anxious to see the statute repealed but was opposed to the expense of a deputation. The local member was the proper person to present the memorial. He cited the expense of the railway refund deputation to Ottawa two years ago.

Mr. Gilray said the clerk had sent copies of the memorial to all the other county councils asking co-operation, and there would certainly be a general move one way or the other.

Mr. Gordon moved, seconded by Mr. Irwin, that Mr. Clark's name be added to the deputation.

Mr. Kerr said he had advocated giving assistance to the Thornbury bridge because he believed the law could compel it, but he was just as agreeable now to the repeal or amendment of the section. He would like to see it amended in such a way as to give councils discretionary power, as there were cases where no doubt it should be given. The difficulties regarding evidence mentioned by Mr. Clark he thought should be laid before the municipal committee by the deputation so that amendment in that respect might be had also.

After Mr. Agnew and Mr. Clark had spoken, Mr. Pedlar asked for the yeas and nays on the former motion. The council were found to stand 34 for and 9 against the deputation.

Mr. Chisholm then moved, seconded by Mr. Schench, that \$200 be granted to the Fruit-growers' Association to assist in the collection of samples of fruit grown in the county for exhibition at the World's Fair; the selections to be made from each municipality, and the name of grower and township to be attached to each.

Mr. Sing protested that it was too late to deal with the resolution that night, and moved that it be referred to the finance committee to report upon. The motion was carried and the council adjourned at a quarter to twelve.
