The budget debate was ended last week by a vote which gave the government a majority of 54. The debate has been distinguished by some magnificent speeches, among which one by Dr Sprou's took a prominent place. The Manitoba school matter is now before Parliament, Mr. Tarte having brought it into prominence. Sir John Thompson, during the course of an able speech, said that the government were now taking the proper steps with regard to the appeal. As trustees constituted by the Confederation Act of the rights of the minorities, they were bound to hear that appeal. They would do what the constitution bade them do, and in doing that they would do what was right as between all classes.

A couple of Canadian Methodist ministers have lately received "calls" to wealthy churches in the United States and found it their duty to accept. One of these, upon application to the American conference, was rejected and had to return to Canada a sadder if not a wiser man. An American minister hit a nail on the head when he said that "Canada gives shelter to many of our worst criminals, and should retain her best ministers in order to protect her morals." Another believed in annexing Canada, but did not believe in doing it piecemeal in the manner proposed, thereby usurping the proper functions of the government itself. They were both right. The United States has an able clergy of her own, and it is the duty of ours to remain at their posts and not go hunting the almighty dollar.

Artemesia Council.

Artemesia Township Council met in the Town Hall, Flesherton, on Monday, the reeve in the chair. Members all present. Communications were received from the Police Trustees of Flesherton, estimates for 1893; from James McMullen and others, petition re enlarging of school section No. 10; from S. Damude and the reeve, report on treasurer's securities, stating that these were satisfactory; report of committee re expenditure on town line Proton and Artemesia, stating that Proton had expended \$18.40 more than Artemesia during the past four years, and recommending an expenditure of that amount. Accounts were read from J. McArthur, expenses re investigation of treasurer's securities, \$1.57; from W. J. Bellamy, registrations during 1892, \$14.70; from W. H. Thurston, assessors rolls and blanks, \$10.25.

McMillan-Kells-That the reeve and councillor Damude be a committee to inquire into the sufficiency of treasurer's securities, and report at this meeting of council.-Carried.

Kells-McMillan-That the report of committee appointed to report on the sufficiency of the treasurer's securities be accepted and filed.-Carried.

Damude-McMillan-That no further grants be made to Phoebe Boyde, indigent, residing in Collingwood township. We consider each township should provide for their own indigents.-Carried

Kells-Damude-That the petition of James McMullen and others, re certain changes in school sections 10, 3, and 6, be received and the clerk to notify all the interested parties as required by law to attend next meeting of this council at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m., on the first Monday in April.-Carried.

Damude-Pedlar-That J. Lockhart be paid \$3.00, being half cost of culvert on townline Proton and Artemesia.-Carried.

Damude-McMillan-That the report of the committee re townline Proton and Artemesia, be received and adopted.-Carried.

Damude-Pedlar-That bill for telegrams, amounting to \$1.57, be paid.-Carried.

Pedlar-Kells-That the auditors report as finally audited be accepted by this council and the auditors be paid the sum, \$8.00 each, and \$2.00 each for extra work.-Carried.

Kells-McMillan-That the reeve secure legal advice re the amount of the township rate this council should pay to the trustees of the police village of Flesherton, and to what extent if at all, is this township responsible for accident within the limits of the police village.-Carried.

Pedlar-McMillan-That the reeve and Mr. Damude be a committee to finally audit the auditors report.-Carried.

Damude-McMillan-That the clerk be paid \$2.00 for letter copying book for the purpose of copying important letters of the clerk, in connection with communications of this township, also \$14.70 for the registration of births, deaths, and marriages as per certificate of registrar general, also W. H. Thurston for blank assessment rolls, etc., \$10.25.-Carried.

Damude-McMillan-That the appropriation for the year 1893 for improvement of roads, culverts, etc., be \$1000, and the said amount be apportioned to the several wards and the police village of Flesherton in ratio to their several assessments.-Lost.

Damude-Pedlar-That no special grants be made for road purposes until the usual appropriations for road purposes be made.-Carried.

Bylaw No. 491, to appoint municipal officers, was introduced and read a first and second time. The officers appointed by this bylaw are as follows:
