Division Court.

Division Court was held in the Town Hall on Saturday last before Judge Morrison. There were only eight cases on the docket, one of the most important of which was adjourned until next court, namely that of Smith v. Holley, an action to recover the price of a horse that died from the effects of a collision which

took place on the 2nd Jan. last on the public highway.

Toronto General Trusts Co. v. A. McLean—Claim for goods sold. Non-suit.

Anderson et al v. Thompson—Suit brought for rent. Deft. lives in Mulmur. Defence held that court had no jurisdiction, lands rented and deft. both being in Mulmur. The lease was executed in Proton. The Judge held that there was jurisdiction and gave judgment for plaintiff for \$35.

W. J. White v. Perfection Hoop and Veneer Co.—Claim for wages of \$33.92. Judgment was given for full amount.

N. Henderson v. T. Wilson—Action on note for \$45.65. Judgment for plaintiff for \$39.95.

Watson v. Livingston—Action on account for \$20.35. Plaintiff lives at Walters Falls. Judgment given for full amount.

McTavish v. Holley—Action brought to recover promissory notes which defendant claimed to have paid along with other notes. The Judge decided that there had been some mistake on both sides, and therefore divided the costs. The matter was unravelled with apparent satisfaction to both parties.

This concluded the business of the court, with the exception of several judgment summons cases.

County and District.

Mr. Thos McCarroll has disposed of his thoroughbred stallion Lexington to Mr. George Jenkins, of Carman, Manitoba. Stockmen will regret that Lexington is about to leave these parts, as he has proved himself to be one of the best sire horses of his class. Mr Jenkins may congratulate himself on his purchase. Breeders in the vicinity of Carman will be pleased to learn of this valuable addition to their sire horses.—Mirror.

David Mullaney, aged 71, died in Owen Sound jail a week ago Saturday. Old age and general debility was the cause.

General News.

The Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario West is in session at Orangeville this week.

Two hundred plasterers working on the World's Fair buildings at Chicago have struck for an increase in wages from \$4.50 to \$5 per day.

Capitalists are negotiating with the Manitoba government for aid towards building another railroad between Winnipeg and Lake Superior.

William Archer and Bennett, the leaders of the "daylight robber" gang, were on Saturday at the sessions convicted of the crime charged against them at Toronto. Sentence was deferred.

Sir John Thompson left Ottawa for Europe Thursday. Senator Bowell will be acting premier, Mr. Ouimet acting minister of justice, and Mr. Foster leader in the house.

In the British commons on Monday Sir Wm. Vernon Harcourt announced that the second reading of the Irish home rule bill would be postponed until after Easter.
