A London cable says that it is possible that within a month the present restrictions on the Canadian cattle trade will be removed.

Ten men were dashed to pieces in the perpendicular shaft of the Calumet & Hecla mine, near Houghton, Mich., Saturday. The cage fell over 3,000 feet.

The bill providing that druggists may only sell liquors on a doctor's certificate, passed its second reading Friday in the Local Legislature.

The new Cunard steamer Campani, which sailed from New York for Liverpool on May 6, arrived at Queenstown at 9:30 yesterday morning, having made the passage from Sandy Hook in 5 days 17 hours and 42 minutes, the fastest eastward passage ever made.

The Mt. Forest Confederate has enlarged its border to the extent of eight columns. It has discarded the "boiler plate," and is thereby much improved in appearance. Well, here's to you.

There is not a shop license in the whole county of Halton. In 1874 there were 61 licensed taverns and 4 shops; today there are not half as many of the former and none at all of the latter.
