 Court of Revision, 1893.
- Laughlin—Watson—That the clerk
 be paid one-half years postage, \$3.11;
 the bill of H. E. Glendinning for 200
 blanks, Court of Revision, and \$4.00 for
 printing under drainage By-law 20, \$1.80
- Laughlin—Shaw— That Jas. Corbett
 be paid \$1.00 for having dead horse bur-
 ied.

Shaw—Watson— That div. money
 for 1893 be \$150 for each commissioner
 for road improvements.

Watson—Corbett— That application
 of Jas. Kinsman for opening ditch on
 townline Proton and Egremont be ap-
 proved. Clerk to notify Egremont coun-
 cil to appoint commissioner to meet com-
 missioner of div. 3, say Saturday, June
 17th, at 4 p. m.

Shaw—Corbett— That the Reeve
 and Councilor Laughlin be appointed to
 attend letting drains under By-law 20, on
 behalf of municipality.

That as recommended by committee
 grants be given to the following roads:
 230 side road, between 2nd & 4th con \$100
 32nd do concession 1, \$ 20
 Lot 41 & 42, do 3, \$ 20
 Lot 24, do 8, \$ 40
 Lot 36, do 12, \$ 20
 37 side road con. 2 to 5, \$ 60

 urer pay to municipality of West Luther
 \$4.95, due under drainage, West Luther
 & Proton.

Laughlin—Watson— That the coun-
 cil adjourn to meet at Hopeville on July
 8th.
