From Owen Sound.

OWEN SOUND, July 24.—(Special)—Saturday night between 8 and 9 o'clock an accident occurred at the C. P. R. slip, which may result in depriving Dennis Galvin of his right leg. Galvin is a dock laborer and with the rest of the gang, was engaged loading steel rails on a number of vessels in the slip. The unfortunate man was in the hold of the schooner Augusta when a rail slipped as it was being lowered and fell upon him, knocking him down. Galvin was picked up insensible. His leg was terribly crushed. The bone was broken in three places and the flesh was bruised and torn. Drs. Machell and Cameron were called in and set the fractures. They removed several pieces of bone from the leg. The injured limb may yet have to be amputated. One of Galvin's hands was also badly hurt by the falling rail. He has a wife and family dependent on him.

The C. P. R. are putting in patent steel cattle-guards, instead of the old-fashioned timber affairs.

At a meeting of the Citizens' Committee on Saturday night to consider the advisability of going ahead with a bicycle tournament most gratifying results were received from the members of the Canvassing Committee, and it was unanimously decided to hold a big wheeling event here.
