## General News.

It is expected that the present session of the Imperial parliament will close at the end of next week.

The trotting stallion Gold Ring went an exhibition mile at Windsor in 2.12½, the fastest performance in harness on a Canadian track.

Lord and Lady Aberdeen arrived at Quebec Sunday morning on board the Sardinian.

Thos. Barber, harnessmaker, of Alton, was fatally shot on Saturday by the accidental discharge of a shotgun, which he was cleaning.

Fred Bryan, who assaulted the editors of the Orangeville Advertiser on account of some remarks made in their paper concerning the recent championship lacrosse match, was fined \$30 and costs by Police Magistrate Pattullo.

Jennie Wonch was tried at the Barrie assizes last week before Chief Justice Armour for the murder of her mother and three-year old child near Collingwood in February last. The jury, after an absence of fifty minutes, returned with a verdict of not guilty, and the prisoner was thereupon discharged.

GRAVENHURST, Sept. 18.—About a year ago the newspapers contained accounts of the curious case of Sam Murray, a railroad brakeman, of this place. He was paralyzed, as a consequence of an injury received while coupling cars, and for two years was unable to work. Several doctors, among them some Toronto specialists, pronounced him incurable and his case hopeless. The Grand Trunk Railway Company paid him his total disability claim, and the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen was about to pay a similar claim, when Murray astonished everybody by a return to health.
