It is announced that His Excellency the Governor General will proclaim Thursday, Nov. 23, as general Thanksgiving Day this year. This will be rather later in the season than usual.

From the tenth annual report of the inspector of legal offices for the year 1892 we learn that the different judicial officers of Grey County received the following amounts for that year's services: Sheriff Moore, \$1777 98; surrogate judge, \$582; County Crown Attorney Frost, \$498; Clerk of the Peace Armstrong, \$933.26; Mr. Geo. Inglis, local registrar, clerk of the county court and clerk of the surrogate court, \$2648 10. The figures are interesting in view of the constant discussion of the fee system.—O. S. Times.

Division Court.  
Division court was held in Dundalk on Thursday last, before Judge Morrison. Although the docket was not a heavy one, still the cases were interesting, and especially to people of this vicinity. We submit a complete report of the business transacted.

Lamb v. Toronto Gen. Trusts Co., F. H. Lamb, assignee for McGirr & Co., claim on acct. of C. McD. Williams. Set tied between the parties.

I. B. Lucas v. A. Whittaker.—Action on promissory note. Judgment for the plaintiff.

Standard Bank v. Jacob Thompson.—Action on promissory note held by the bank. No one appearing for the plaintiff, judgment entered of non-suit.

Colthard, and George Scott v. Perfection Hoop and Veneer Co., were two cases brought for wages. Judgment in each case was given for the plaintiff.

Greenshields v. Bennett.—Action on promissory note for \$77.25. Defendant claimed that of this amount \$64.40 had been paid. Judgment was given for the balance of \$12.79 and adjournment as to the amount which defendant claimed to have paid.

Dresser v. Hunter.—Action for \$63.10, being amount paid to defendant some years ago, and which defendant applied, it would appear, upon an outlawed claim of his own. Judgment was given for full amount of claim.

Strachan v. Petch.—Action brought to recover the value of a mare which plaintiff had traded with defendant for a horse, in which it was alleged that defendant at time of trade stated that the horse traded by him was perfectly sound. Several witnesses having been examined, it was proven to the court that misrepresentation had been made, and judgment was given for the plaintiff for \$40 and costs, said amount being considered to be the value of the mare, but if mare be returned to plaintiff within three days, in as good condition as when received by defendant, judgment would stand for \$5. and costs.

Fleury's Sons v. McLean was an action on interpleader on goods seized by bailiff but claimed by defendant's brother. The case having been proven, judgment was given for claimant without costs. Mitchell v. W. E. and E. O'Brien was also an interpleader, the bailiff having seized goods which were claimed by defendant's brother, John O'Brien. After a full investigation of the matter, judgment was given for execution creditor, barring claimant.

A number of judgment summonses were dispensed of, and the court arose.
