

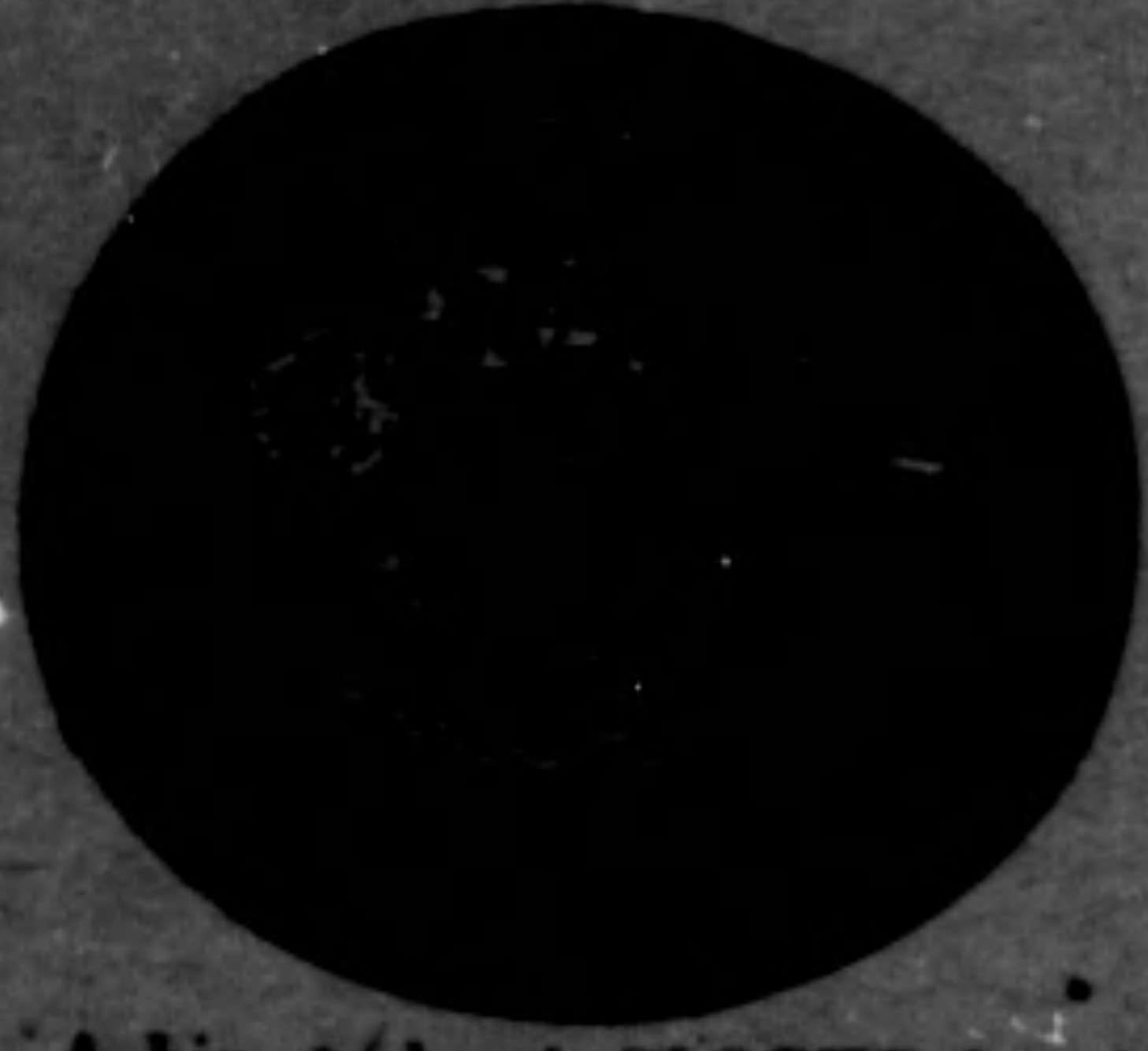

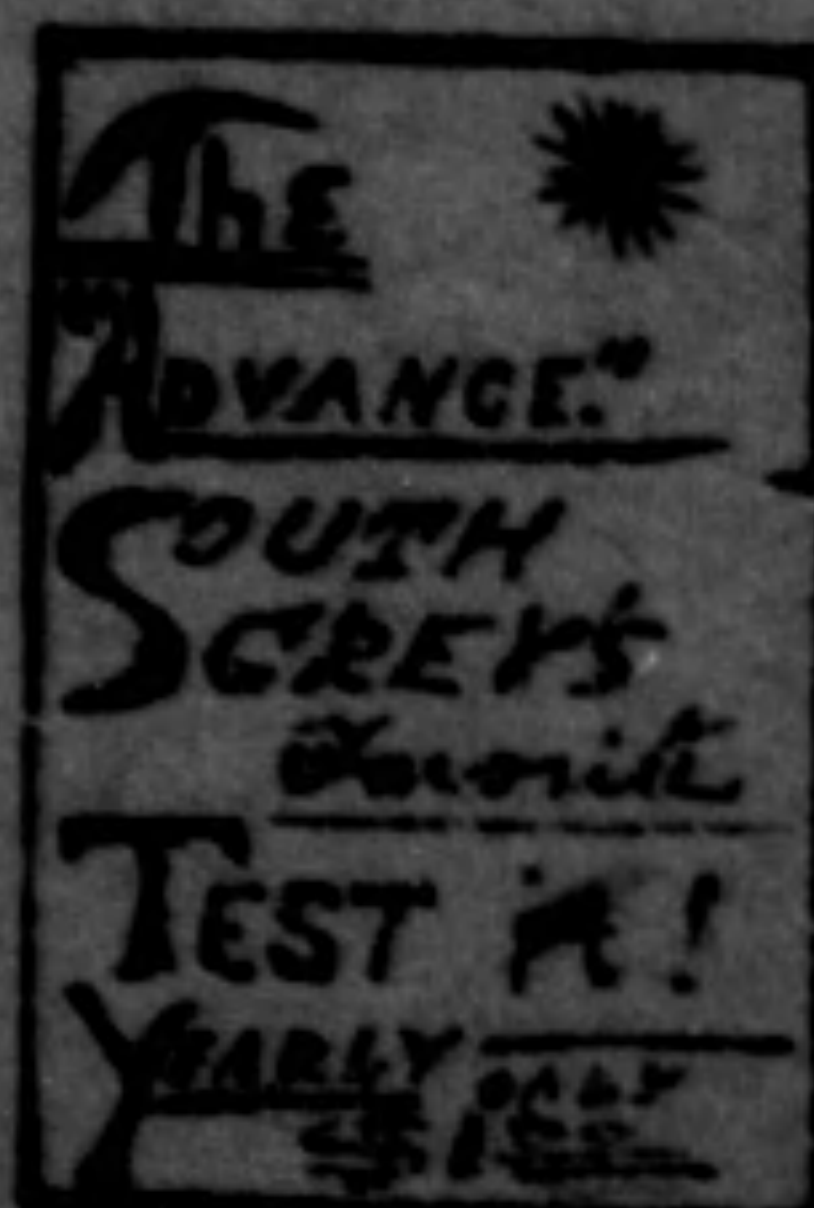

Flesherton Grist and Sawmills Burned

CAUSE OF FIRE A MYSTERY, BUT SUPPOSED TO BE ACCIDENTAL.

Citizens were awakened by the alarm bell on Tuesday morning at 2.30 to find the grist and sawmills, owned by W. K. Fleisher, in a mass of flames. Those who first saw the fire state that it started in the upper storey about the centre of the building. Mr. Ford, who has been running the business, states that he left the mill at 5 p. m., returning at 6, and that everything was all right when he left for the night. The building burned fiercely, and inside of an hour and a half not a vestige was left, excepting a large portion of the frame and dam. The building and machinery was insured in the Waterloo Mutual for \$2,500, and on the stock there was an insurance of \$500 in the Norwich Union. The property was valued at \$4,000, and the loss is consequently over \$5,000. Added to this Mr. Wm. Bradley, of Holstein, held an interest in the property of several hundred, but allowed his insurance, which covered the amount, to lapse last month. The mill will no doubt be rebuilt, as this is too valuable a power to remain idle.

Mrs. W. K. Fleisher and the Flesherton Milling Co. desire to express thanks through The Advance for assistance in saving property at the fire.

The circular saw was saved, also a number of bags of chop, and two bags of flour.

Two hundred bushels of Manitoba wheat arrived for the mill on Monday, but was not placed in the mill.

Mr. T. Bulmer, photographer, lost a camera worth about \$70 in the fire. He had been taking a picture at the mill and in an evil moment decided not to bring the instrument home until he had discovered whether or not the picture was a good one.
