**POLITICAL POT POURRI.**

Wednesday of last week a cold wave struck the Conservative party in Winnipeg. On that day Joseph Martin, the Liberal candidate, was elected by a majority of 425. For twenty-one years Winnipeg has been staunch Conservative, the late member, Hugh John McDonald, carrying the constituency by over 500 of a majority. The result is looked upon by the Reformers as a veritable Waterloo and as "The handwriting on the wall." There is no doubt whatever that it is the former, whatever the latter may be. Winnipeg demands radical tariff reform, and that, together with other secret interests have worked the downfall of the Conservative standard in Winnipeg.

Political matters in Ontario are fast assuming an interesting phase. Every paper which one picks up tells of one or more nominations made by some of the half score of societies now in existence. Perhaps the most interesting case of all is that of North Grey. For the local house Mr. B. Stark, of Derby, is the nominee for the Advanced Prohibitionists, P. of L., McCarthyites, and presumably the P. P. A. He assumes all of these responsibilities with sublime faith in their amalgamating qualities, and believing their interests lie parallel. It would be interesting to note just how the various societies running Mr. Stark can reconcile their own ideas on the matter. If Mr. Stark is right, why do these separate societies exist—why do they not adopt a single charter and have done with it?

The Hon. Thos. McGreevy and N. K. Connolly have been sentenced to one year in prison for misappropriation of funds, or in other words stealing from the public till. This verdict has been received with great satisfaction by all honest people—politicians or otherwise. It is to be feared that others who are just as guilty, morally, have gone free.

Sir John Thompson has been the recipient of another honor from the hands of Her Majesty the Queen, having been appointed a member of the Privy Council, carrying with it the title of "Right Honorable." This is the second instance where a like honor has been accorded to a Canadian. The Right Honorable Sir John McDonald having been the first recipient. Sir John Thompson won his new title through his duties in connection with the Behring Sea arbitration.

The change in the American tariff by the new Tariff Bill is a sweeping one. A large number of articles which Canada is interested in have been placed upon the free list, including the product of the great Canadian hen, and a change has been made from a specific to an ad valorem duty all round. The duty on barley has been lowered from 80 per cent. to about 12 per cent. Wool has been made free. Other articles which have been placed on the free list, and which Canada is in a position to export, are: beef, mutton, pork and all kinds of meats; binding twine, animals for breeding purposes, asbestos, nickel, salt. There are a large number of articles placed on the free list, not of great importance in themselves, but in the aggregate are worth looking after. The bill has not yet passed Congress, but no doubt will do so; and we believe the new tariff will work to the benefit of Canada in many particulars.
