Patron Entertainment.

On Thursday, the 21st Dec., the "centennial" association of Patrons of Industry gave a very enjoyable entertainment in No. 9 school house on the 8th con. The schoolhouse was crowded with a very orderly audience. Mr. Joseph Pedlar discharged the duties of chairman in his usually happy manner. Mr. Thomas Gamey, nominee of the Patrons as M. P. P. at next Provincial election, and Mr. Thorp Wright, Township President for the Patron association, were the only two speakers. Both gentlemen spoke to the point and treated of several glaring abuses which need reforming, and which are included in the Patron platform. Mr. Meldrum, of Eugenia, was called upon for a speech. He thought there had been enough of speeches, but gave a nice recitation from Cowper's "Tune-piece," instead. Nearly all the rest of the entertainment was by members of the "Centennial." The songs by Mr. Joseph Bowerman, Mr. David Smith, Mr. Wm. Pedlar, the Misses Hoppers and the choir, were well rendered and much applauded by the audience. There were also several good recitations, particularly that by Miss McIntyre, teacher. Miss Mary Cameron "Entertained her Sister's Beau" to perfection, and the dialogue, "Soup Making," was splendid. Messrs. W. C. Pedlar and Dan McDonald gave us several beautiful selections on the violin, accompanied by Chris Meldrum. Miss Meldrum was organist and she played with great taste and ability. Altogether everything went well, and all seemed to enjoy the evening's entertainment. The "Centennial" is probably the most promising association in the township. They meet weekly and at nearly every meeting something intellectual is brought forward for discussion, and great harmony prevails. The admission fee to the entertainment was merely nominal. We humbly think that such associations, conducted as this one is, apart from the primary object, may be the means of doing much good. I notice that in large commercial centres in the old Country, Temperance councils and other organizations are doing a great amount of good by getting up first class entertainments for the working classes. They secure the best talent available and the admission fee is from three to six cents. As a result the drinking habit is reduced to a minimum in the "Industrial classes," and the sight of a drunk man is in many large towns a very rare occurrence. I don't say the people are all total prohibitionists, but are becoming daily more temperate. If Patrons of Industry, generally, were to follow the example of the Centennial, we have no doubt a similar result would follow.

An Osprey Pioneer.

On Tuesday morning, Dec. 26, Elizabeth Booth died in her 78th year, at the residence of her son Mr. William C. Millar, Osprey. Mrs. Booth was a native of Baffshire, Scotland, where in 1840 she married the late Alexander Millar, who died in 1848, leaving his widow with a young son, now Mr. Wm. C. Millar a respected townsman and merchant of Collingwood. In 1853 Mrs. Booth came to Canada, being at that time married to Mr. Booth. They settled in Osprey, in March, 1854, where deceased resided until her death, with the exception of occasional visits to her son in Collingwood, and to her daughter, Mrs. H. Moore of the town line, Singhampton. Mrs. Moore was a daughter by the second marriage, and there was also a son who died in youth. Deceased was a quiet and unassuming Christian woman, who was loved and esteemed by the many friends she made during her long residence in this section. —Enterprise.
