His Latest Invention

A. G. Hunter, of Dundalk, is known as somewhat of a mechanical genius. His latest invention is thus dealt with by the Canadian Engineer: "A. G. Hunter, Dundalk, Ont., has invented a machine for the rapid disinfection of hospitals, quarantine stations, etc., which, from its simple and portable nature, appears to be likely to fill a long felt want. By means of this little instrument the sulphur dioxide is given off under the complete control of the operator. It has the further advantage of being able to disinfect clothes and bedding without destroying either their color or fibre. Mr. Hunter has also designed another machine for the purpose of using disinfectants in solution. The carbolic acid or other disinfectant, as the case may be, is sprinkled over the walls and on the furniture in such fine sprays that not the slightest damage is done to them. One sanitary authority expresses the opinion that these disinfectant machines will very soon take the place of the crude methods at present in use."

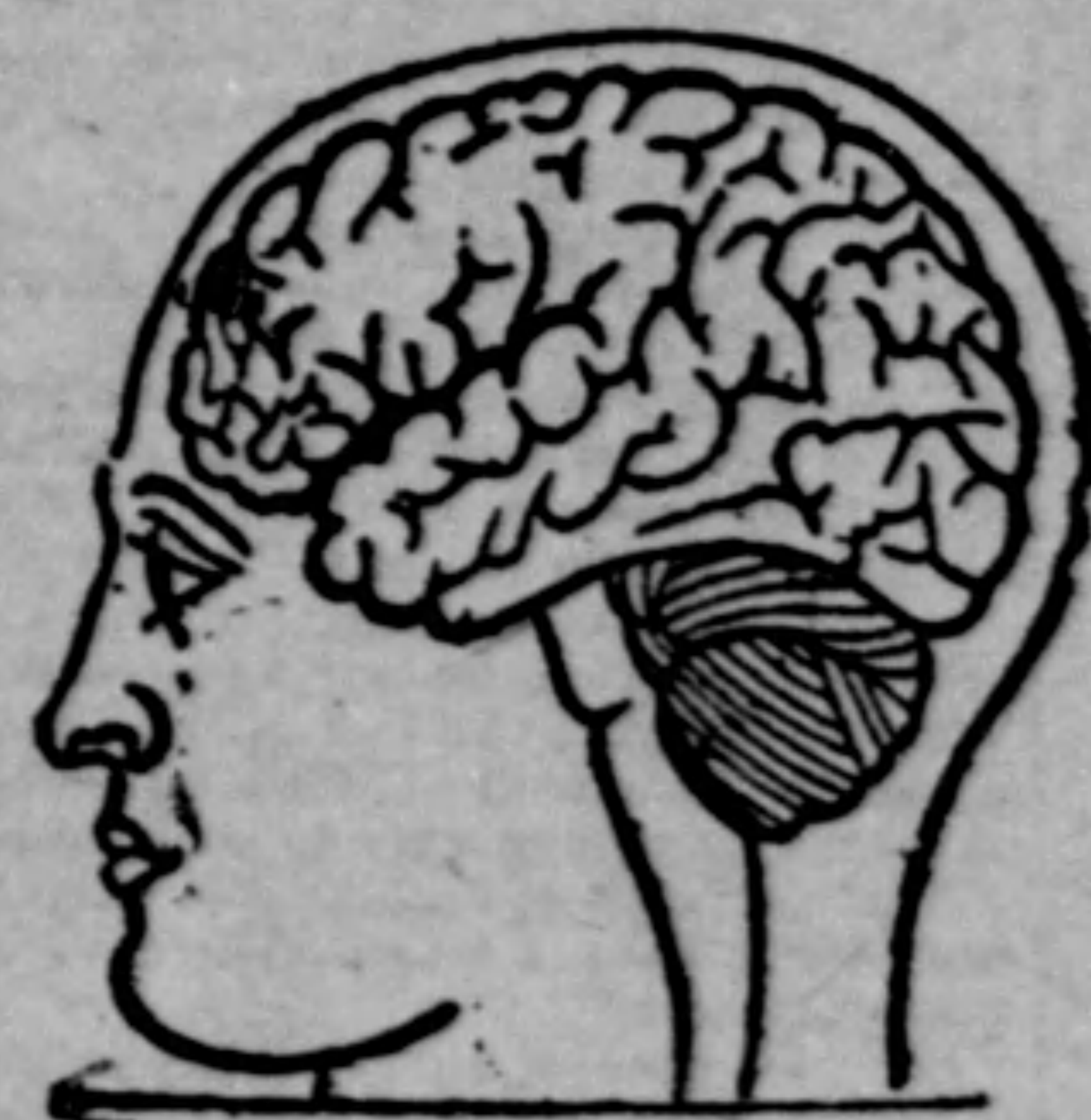
