Bro. Blythe's "Experience."

"The editorial "we" of the News had an experience in last Monday's blizzard which he would not care to repeat, and which, had it not been for timely assistance, might have resulted seriously. Those of our readers who were not out on a bare bleak hill about 6 o'clock that evening can scarcely realize the extent of the storm. As it happened that's the sort of position from which "we" watched the fury of the storm in all its strength and grandeur just about the hour mentioned, and it appeared to us that there was a great deal more fury and strength mixed with blinding snow than there was grandeur about the storm. We left Holland Centre about 6 o'clock that evening and pushed through a good many deep drifts and had got along as far as Fowell's hill, and all the time the storm kept getting worse, until at times it was impossible to see as far as the horse's head, which was covered with snow and ice. The wind had piled the snow up to a depth of six to eight feet on that hill and when the horse got into it he couldn't get out, and the more he plunged the deeper in he went. Forgetting our avoirdupois, we got out to help the horse and down we went, and the more we struggled to get out the deeper we got in, and the drifting snow was fast covering over us and the horse, when Councillor Galbraith and Treasurer Cameron came along and helped us out of the difficulty, and in all probability saved us from perishing in the storm, as it would have been but a matter of a short time until we would have been snowed under. We gratefully acknowledged the kindness of Messrs. Galbraith and Cameron for the hearty manner in which they jumped to our assistance without waiting for an invitation or an explanation.—Chatsworth News.

Burned to a Crisp

SAD FATE OF A GLENELG TOWNSHIP FARMER—DIED FOR HIS FAMILY.
A despatch from Durham last week says: One of the saddest accidents that ever occurred in this vicinity happened the other day. Samuel Oldfield's house caught fire and was burned to the ground, and the unfortunate man, after rescuing his children from danger he himself perished in the flames. Messrs. John McInnes and Charles Vaughan were the first who arrived on the scene, and they did all that could be done to recover the body, but as there was no water near, they had to battle the fiery elements with snow. After working for nearly two hours they succeeded in recovering what was left of the body, which was found in the cellar with the arms and legs completely burned off. Mrs. Overfield was also badly burned while assisting to save the children, and is in a helpless condition. Mr. Charles Vaughan acted the good Samaritan, and took the family to his home and made them as comfortable as circumstances would permit.
