The Assizes.
The smallest docket in a score or more of years, was presented at the Assize Court which opened in the Court House, Monday at 2 o'clock, Justice McMahon presiding. Two civil cases and three criminal cases composed the list. Justice McMahon in his opening address congratulated the county on the small docket. He then explained the new criminal code on theft and assault, and unlawful wounding. The cases were then called in the order named.
Grigg v. Anderson—An action arising out of an attack on the little daughter of the plaintiff, C. K. Grigg, by an alleged vicious dog, owned by the defendant, Mrs. Chas. Anderson. Both parties are residents of Owen Sound. The evidence submitted by the plaintiff went to prove that the dog had at various times attacked and bitten witnesses; that the defendant had been notified of the viciousness of the animal and had refused to have it disposed of. The evidence for the defence claimed that the dog was not vicious, that in the past he had been used for the defence of the plaintiff's property and that it was simply performing the duties of a watch dog. The evidence was conflicting. Justice McMahon charged in favor of small damages for the plaintiff. The jury brought in a verdict of \$150 and County Court costs. H. G. Tucker for plaintiff; Creaser & Smith, and Walter Nesbit (Toronto) for the defendant.
Boyd v. Platt (non-jury case)—An action brought by James L. Boyd of Sydenham, against S. Platt, late of the law firm of Creaser & Platt, for misappropriation of money. Plaintiff charged defendant with having misappropriated funds paid to the latter by one McLeod on a mortgage. Action had been taken against McLeod and dismissed on the ground that the money had been paid Platt. A consent verdict was entered of \$275 if paid within 10 days, or \$400 otherwise, without costs. Masson & Evans for plaintiff; Walter Nesbitt for defendant.
Queen v. McMahon—as ault. This was a unique case in Canadian law courts. The prisoner is a deaf and dumb man, a native of the United States. The question of assault was not considered. When the jury was called, Justice McMahon cited an English case of similar character. The evidence of a sister-in-law was taken on the question of sanity. Two questions were put to the jury by the Court: Was the prisoner a mute by the visitation of God, and whether he was unable to plead to the indictment. These the jury answered without retiring. They were then asked whether they considered the prisoner sane or insane, sound or unsound mind. After a few minutes deliberation in the jury room the prisoner was declared to be of unsound mind. A verdict that he be ordered back to custody during the pleasure of the Lieut.-Governor of the Province was rendered. G. A. Wells, Q. C., for the Crown; H. G. Tucker for prisoner.
Queen v. Alexander Green (colored), theft. The prisoner was charged with having stolen a sum of money from one Freeborn of Lion's Head, at the house of one Eliza Wilson, a prostitute. The latter was the only witness called, and her evidence was considered insufficient by the jury, and after a few minutes deliberation a verdict "not guilty" was recorded. Wells Q. C. for Crown; Lucas & Wright for prisoner.
Queen v. Smith—unlawful wounding.—At the request of Justice McMahon, his Honor Judge Creaser tried this case. The evidence of the complainant, Mrs. Brown, was that the prisoner had entered her home, and committed the assault. The defence endeavored to prove self-defence. Considerable evidence was submitted on both sides—the case lasting until a late hour. The verdict of the jury was guilty; and the prisoner was sentenced to the Central Prison for six months. Wells for Crown; H. G. Tucker for the prisoner.
Gavin v. C. P. B.—An action for damages from death of the plaintiff's son while in the defendant's employ, was settled out of court.
Lang v. Smith—An action of replevin was postponed until the fall assizes.—Times.

Patrons of Industry.

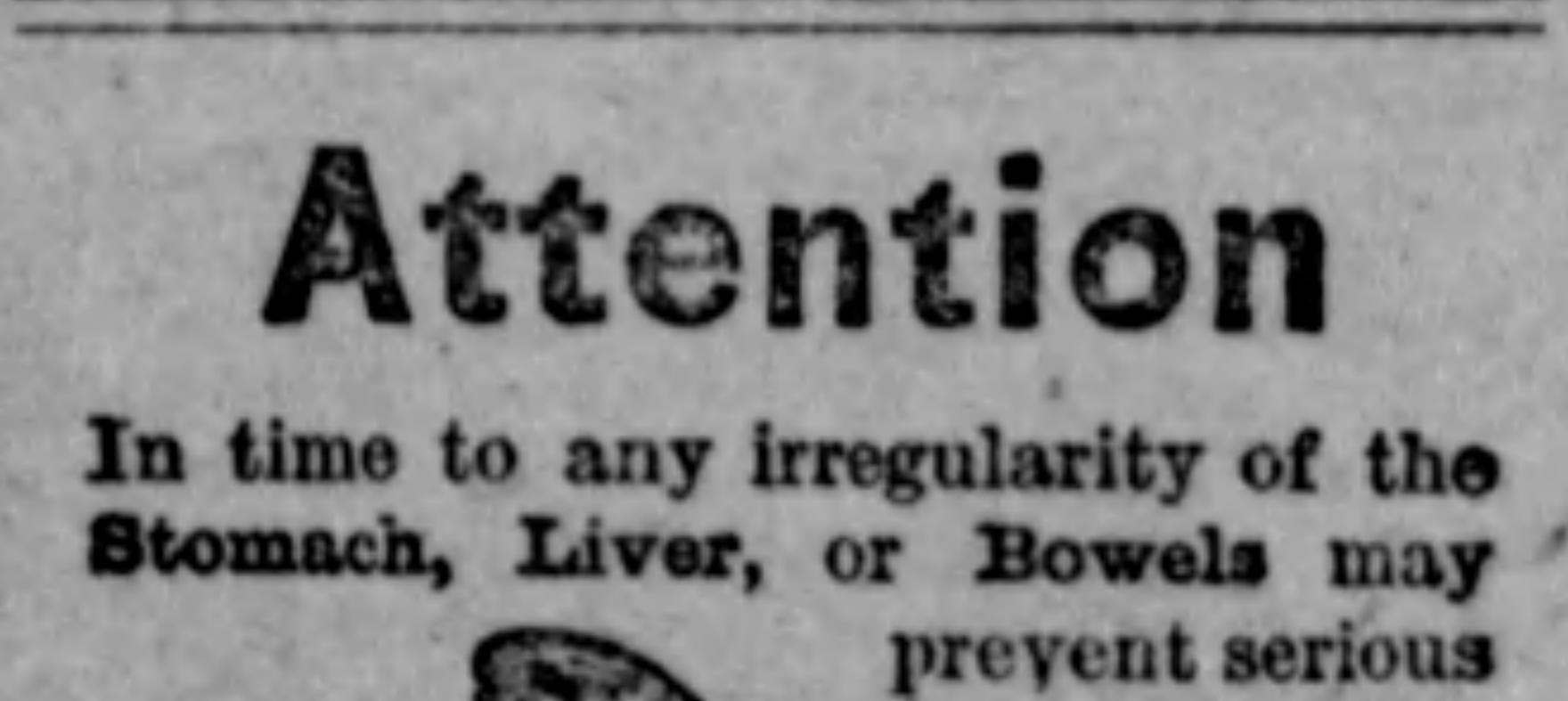
At the meeting of the Grand Lodge in Toronto the Grand Secretary's report shows a membership of about 175,000 in 2,300 subordinate associations, some of which are located in each of the Ontario counties and 73 associations in Quebec. The increase in membership last quarter over that of the previous quarter was 7,809. The receipts last year were \$2,000 more than during the previous year and the aggregate expenditure was \$1,800 less. The Grand Lecturers report referred to the enthusiasm of farmers everywhere in places where mass meetings had been held during the past year. The report of the auditors, Wm. Valens and J. G. Adams, showed the receipts to be \$16,940; the disbursement \$10,420; the assets, \$7,088, and the liabilities, \$266. All the officers are the same as last year.
