Prof. Smith, of the Toronto Veterinary College, paid a visit to Markdale and Flesherton on Monday and Tuesday of this week. The Prof. was here with the view of investigating the prevalent disease among cattle. Nothing new was learned, more than the Advance has already made public. The Prof. visited a number of infested herds and found them all suffering from ergotic poisoning, but believes that with the spring and change of diet the disease will disappear.

A merchant in town had a narrow escape from being shot on Monday evening about 7.30 p. m., a bullet coming whistling through the window a few inches from his head.
