This is the time of year when the housewife seems to the masculine eye to be seized with a craze for producing chaos. She disarranges all the furniture, and what she does not turn out doors she crams in hallways and passages for his un- wayry feet to stumble over. She tears up all the carpets to adorn the clotheslines in the back yard, and not content with her fiendish work she pulls down the cur- tains, leaves the step ladder in the draw- ing-room leaning up against the bare walls, from which she has borne away the pictures. And over and through all the ghastly scene is a smell of fresh paint.

The paper hanger, the kalsominer, the carpet stretcher and the genius of the scrubbing brush, are in possession, and more damage is done to carpet, furniture and woodwork than a whole year of ordi- nary usage would give them.

Some time about the middle of the third week—when the poor subjugated breadwinner has learned by experience all the sharp angles and fresh paint spots to be avoided and is even becoming esigned to disorder—some time, I say, well on into the third week, he walks into a transformation scene. Everything is so pretty and fresh it is a; if he had never been there before. Can this be the same old carpet? How luxurious the carpet feels to his feet! Who would have thought curtains could make such a dif- ference? How filmy, white and fairylike they look! And how much a little paper adds to the furnishing of a room!

If the housewife has taste she has selected a paper to serve as a background to pictures and furniture—not with a pattern that will fly out and strike the sense of sight before anything else. If her rooms are low she has put the border on the ceiling to apparently add to the height of the room, and if she is wise has chosen a paper with ceiling, wall and border all ready made to match each other.

A vague thought is forming in the man's mind. Is this impression of beauty all due to the absence of dirt and dust, or had not the weeks of chaos something to do with his appreciation of it? The law of contrast works so strongly upon the senses.

At times he has thought that if a little little less brawn and a little more brain were used, these scenes of discomfort might have been avoided.

But there is a depth of wisdom in Madam's method and by pursuing it the final effect is certainly heightened; so it is with a tired but satisfied smile she views the result of her toil.

Something significant happened this week. The first annual meeting of the National Council of women of Canada opened in Ottawa, the Countess of Aber- deen being in the chair.

Of course as might be expected at a woman's meeting, the hall was beautifully decorated with bunting, and flowers filled every nook.

Women from every city in the Domi- on, and representing all agencies for the uplifting of humanity were there. Liter- ary and social clubs and their influence on Canadian literature and life were dis- cussed as also were educative philan- thropic and religious topics. Mrs. Dig- nam, of the Woman's Art Association, read a paper on "Art Clubs," and Mrs. Capps one on "Musical Clubs." I looked in vain for the name of the redoubtable Dr. Augusta Stowe Gullen, of Toronto. She was probably too busy with her large practise, or from her position on the school board, combating abuses and the innovations which encroach upon the liberties of the school teachers of Toronto. Her mother, Dr. Emily Stowe, however, was there, a veteran in the battle for the enfranchisement of women.

It is the age of specialization, but also the age of organization, and it is only one of the signs of the times when we see these women specialists in their various lines—women representing so many and diverse societies, creeds and races banding together in one common council for the benefit of all.

"Union is strength."
 It is said women are not "Clubable." In the city of London alone there are eight magnificent women's clubs. The bane of unenlightened womanhood is a cowardly conservatism, which sippers a pretty sneer at the woman who braves ridicule and misrepresentation for the sake of the pretty sneerer.

It will take some time yet to evolve from the traditionally subservient half of the race, the independent woman of the future. And we are living in the time of transition. Do.

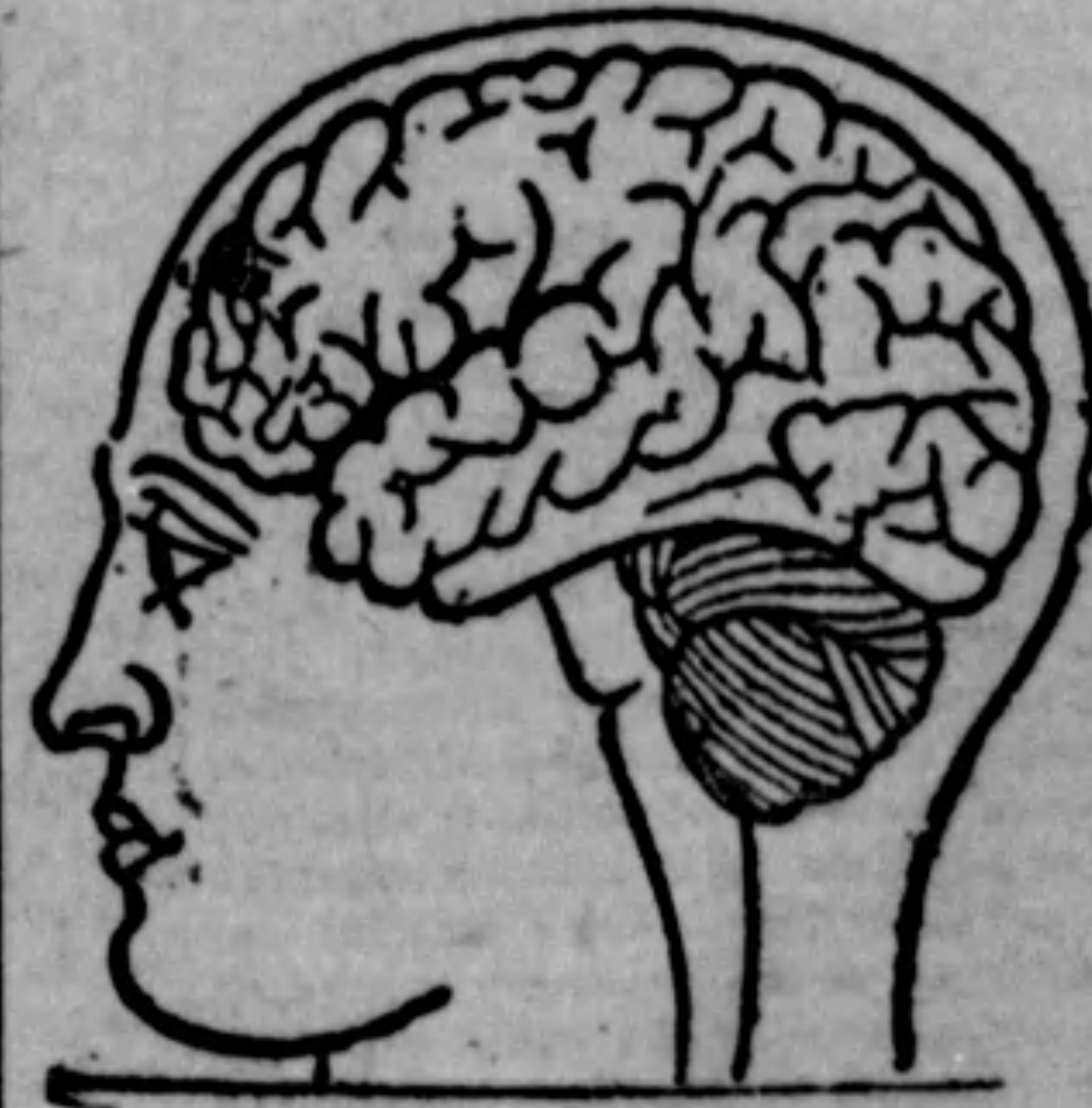
