A two-cent letter postage rate was discussed once more in parliament on Monday, but without any definite result. The Postmaster-General estimated that the yearly loss to the revenue by a two-cent rate would amount to \$800,000.

A bill is now before Parliament dealing with ocean freight on cattle. It is claimed that the steamship companies have been fixing rates according to the markets and monopolizing all the profits. If this is so they have practically "killed the goose that laid the golden egg." In order that the bird may have a chance to recover it is hoped parliament will see its way clear to confine the efforts of those who are choking her. The farmers who own the said goose have rights that must be respected.

Township Council.

Township Council met in the Town Hall on Monday, the reeve in the chair, and with all the members present. Communications were read from Jas. Brander, declining office of road overseer; from Isaac Sinclair and others, petition re opening 130 sideroad, N. E. T. & S. R.; from J. R. Hogg and others, petition asking council to gravel a part of the road leading to Meaford north of Eugenia; from the auditors, report on treasurer's sureties; from police trustees of Flesherton, statement of amount required to be charged to village rate, viz., \$250; from W. C. Hanley, report of meeting held in S. S. No. 9, denouncing proposed changes in that section; from the Dominion Live Stock Association, asking action of council re bill before the House of Commons regarding freight rates on cattle. A communication was also received from the county treasurer showing that the following lands in Artemesia had been sold in 1893 and are now liable to taxation:

Part lot 20, 10th con., 1 acre, sold to Richard Smith and others.
North-east part lot 135, 2nd con., S.W. T. & S. R., 10 acres, sold to Wm. L. Wright.

Lot 1, Harvey st. south, Priceville, half acre, sold to Allan McInnis.

Lot 10 and 11, James st. south, Priceville, half acre each, sold to Donald McMillan.

Lots 10 and 11, Harvey st. north, half acre each, sold to Donald McMillan.

Bills were read from R. J. Sproule, examining treasurer's sureties, \$4, and from W. H. Thurston, printing, \$18.

Bylaw No. 502, detaching lot No. 24, con. 10, Artemesia, from S.S. No. 11 and attaching same to No. 13, was passed in open council.

Kells—Thompson—That in reference to the petition of Wm. Walker and Wm. Wilson asking that lots 31 in the 10 and 11th concessions be detached from S. S. No. 9, and placed in S. S. No. 13, be not entertained. Carried.

Kells—Best—That W. H. Thurston's acct for printing Auditors' Report, \$17, and for bills \$1, be paid and the reeve issue his order for the same. Carried.

Best—Kells—That R. J. Sproule, auditor, be paid \$1.50 for attending at Durham to examine treasurer's sureties; registrar fees, \$1.00; conveyance to Durham, \$1.50; Total, \$4. Carried.

Kells—Best—That the council of the township of Artemesia fully endorse the sentiment contained in the letter here read of the Dominion Live Stock Association in reference to the ocean freights on cattle exported from Canada to Great

Britain and do sign the petition now presented to the House of Commons of Canada and do desire that the said House of Commons do take into consideration the matter contained in such petition. Carried.

Kells—McMillan—That four steel road scrapers be provided by the clerk at a reasonable price to be distributed by the said clerk where most needed, and that no more scrapers be provided this year, the reeve to order payment. Carried.

Kells—Thompson—That an additional \$4 be granted John McIntyre for the month of March, he being very ill and unable to provide for himself in any way, the reeve to order payment, John Braniff to see after him for said month of May. Carried.

Kells—Thompson—That Commissioner of ward 2 repair Bridge on Toronto and Sydenham road by putting new covering and handrailing on same. Carried.

Best—Thompson—That the sum of \$350, be paid to Mr. Rumsey for culvert built on west backline, and charge the same to ward appropriation No. 3. Carried.

Thompson—McMillan—That the petition of J. R. Hogg and others be laid on table for further consideration. Carried.

Thompson—Best—That the petition of W. J. Leaver and others be not entertained by this council at present. Carried.

Thompson—McMillan—That this council do not deem it necessary to expend any money on townline where the Ephrasia council calls for it, at present. Carried.

Kells—McMillan—That this council meet as a committee on assessment at 2 o'clock p. m. on Tuesday, 15th of May '94. Carried.

Kells—McMillan—That the courts of revision for this the township of Artemesia be held at the Town Hall, village of Flesherton on the first Monday in June, commencing at 10 o'clock a. m. Carried.
