DEAR DOT—As some people appear to doubt that many women are wrongly treated by their husbands in money matters I wish to give my testimony on that point. A young married lady of my acquaintance, whose husband was comparatively wealthy, wished to attend a singing school. The fee was fifty cents, to be paid in advance, and she had to ask her husband for this small sum, which he politely refused, telling her it would be time enough to give her the money after the teacher had earned it. This lady remarked to my sister that she really felt ashamed to go to the class and be the only one unable to pay as required. My sister, who had also joined and wished to keep her from grieving over this unkind treatment said, "Well I will do the same as you, we will both tell the teacher we will pay later on." This they did and after a few weeks the lady managed to secure the amount of her debt. This husband spared no expense in household decoration, or in clothing his wife; he would also buy a great number of books to suit his own taste but when she requested him to purchase a "Pansy" book for her he refused, saying he had already ordered ten dollars worth of Bible commentaries and similar volumes, and he would not waste money on story books, even if they were religious and interesting. He continued for some years denying her the pleasure of having a little money to spend in these ways, and at last she became weak in mind and put him to heavy expense as well as discomfort, which would probably have been avoided had he not disregarded her feelings in this respect. A farmer's wife in this county told me when the children damaged, or broke articles about the house, she was afraid to let her husband know, for, if she asked him for money to replace them he would get into a fearful rage, and act as if he would like to tear the house down over her head, consequently she had to buy this thing without his knowledge, and pay the shop keeper as best she could. I could tell of many similar and even worse cases in this county and other places, but these will show how very unfair are the unequal rights of women. It would be an agreeable change if such wives could hold the purse, and dole out in grudging fashion every cent that was needed by their spouse, and call him to strict account for every five cents that was spent; but it would not last long, for a rebellion equal to a national war would soon be the result. **MARCHAND.**

Like Marchand, we could all multiply instances of meanness similar to the above, which have come under our own personal observation. How many sensitive hearts have been made ashamed by just such treatment! But though there are so many instances come to light, it is nothing to what is covered up and never breathed to the closest friend. It is the accumulation of these small annoyances, hidden away, and worried over in secret, that eventually undermine and sap the mentality, or leave a nervous wreck of the woman subjected to them.

DEAR DOT—Just a short letter to relate my own personal and private experience in this matter.

When I returned from a Ladies' Co I go, where I was supposed to have received all the useful as well as ornamental training necessary to a girl, my parents thought that all that was necessary to my happiness was to be well dressed and enter fully into the round of gayety to which I had access. But my tastes did not lie in that direction, and knowing well that the greatest social success could not satisfy me, and feeling that for me, life must be earnest, I began to look about to see what I could do. But my training had been somewhat superficial, and at any rate had no market value. My plea to be sent somewhere for the training necessary to my making my own way in the world was for a long time disregarded, as my parents—my father particularly—desired me to "be like other girls," his conception being a useless butterfly. But I was young and strong and ambitious, and felt that such an existence would sifle me, so, after much pleading and many, to me, bitter disappointments, I was allowed to fit myself for my work in life. This work has been hard, at times almost more than I could bear, but I have never regretted becoming independent, and having the right to shape my own course. My parents, too, have come to see that I was right and from their present conditions in life are only too glad that I am able to make my own way. **"ALPHA"**

This letter sounds like an argument for the education of girls to some useful line of life, and I shall some day soon have something to say up that topic, but it also bears upon the present. Though the parents were willing to spend freely on dress and amusement, they did not accord

"Alpha" the human right of choosing; whereas, had she had an allowance of money she could have chosen freely between dress and education and saved much time and needless worry. You see the far deeper question of individual freedom is involved the right to say what she should do with her life. Many a girl and woman never gets this right and she is as much a slave as any bought and sold negro of the South in slavery days.

We must close this discussion, hoping it will not be altogether for naught. It was not opened for the fun of the thing, it is much too serious a matter to most women, to be funny.

One gentleman asked me to write about the Jews next week. I pondered his remark for a few minutes, then light broke and I knew that this discussion was hitting hard in one direction.

The following well-known story illustrates what he meant.

A new preacher had come to town and a parishioner, who was his well-wisher, warned him in this wise: "Don't preach against the liquor traffic, as one of our members is a dealer but a strong supporter of the church; and don't mention usury or you will offend some of our most influential people, and don't for anything refer to politics," and so on. "But what shall I preach about?" said the preacher. "Oh, pitch into the Mormons, they haven't got a friend in this district."

Inspector Campbell visited our school on Friday and was much pleased with teacher and pupils. The order is good.

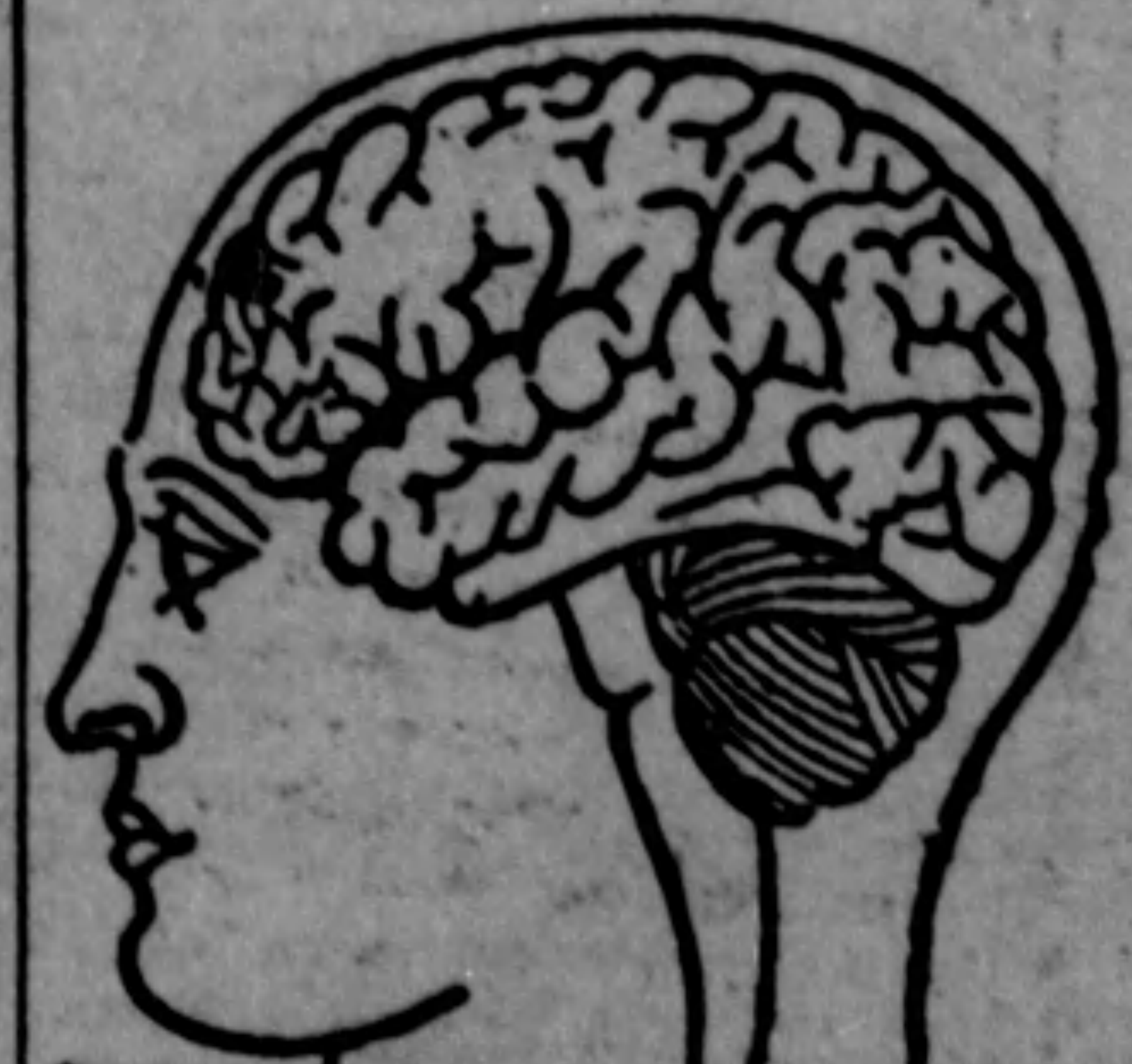
Our young folks are exercising themselves each evening with a game of football.
