Once upon a time I had occasion to remark that "sheer fact is not necessarily true" that is, when it enters the realm of art. Sarcey, the French dramatic critic in the Cosmopolitan for May, bears me out in my statement when he shows how a recent play is spoiled from an artistic standpoint just because it was absolutely accurate in its delineation of facts as they actually took place. Too many facts—incongruous facts,—were crowded into the picture. Just as in a painting there is some central idea or object more prominent than all the rest, and towards which all subsidiary things converge, and just as the same painting would be spoiled by a lot of unmeaning figures and objects, bearing no relation to the central idea, though photographically correct, it would have no artistic value. So in the sister arts of music and letters the same law holds.

This is why I feel my patience waning when I hear people say "Well, but is it true!" or triumphantly assert that a certain story is better because it is true.

Art is the faculty of selection. To illustrate, Sarcey says: suppose "Nature has arranged an admirable landscape in which some rich fool has placed a granite Monstrosity. Well, an artist who may wish to paint the scene so stupid as to paint the ugly building just because by an unhappy accident, it is there, or will he suppress it? Or here is an illustration of my own which often occurs to me in connection with this idea. A notice sits down to paint a picture in which is a black shoe, a shiny shoe. He says to himself, that is a black shoe, so he dips into his ivory black and daubs it on. The result is anything but satisfactory even to his in-artistic eye, but he will be considerably surprised to learn that the effect of black may be given by a variety of other colors, for the shoe is reflecting the light, just as all objects do, more or less. I remember seeing a black gown in a painting, in which, when the lights and shades were minutely examined, not a trace of pure black was to be found. It impressed the imagination as being black, but was as a matter of fact not black at all. So in a novel, however improbable or even impossible the tale, it is the situations and characters are congruous—if one part is the logical outcome of another—the tale is artistically true.

Take for instance the legend of the wandering Jew, which Lew Wallace has lately resurrected and placed upon his canvas as the "Prince of India." For a man to live twelve hundred years and still have no hope of dying is not only not a fact, but is as we understand the laws of life a physical impossibility. Yet the Jew ably serves the author's purpose of showing what would be the effect of the march of history upon a man who not only knew it perfectly, but had participated in all the great events of the succeeding ages. The Jew is constantly comparing present and approaching crises with many similar ones of the past, and is able to prognosticate shrewdly as to their probable outcome.

And so the Jew becomes the type of every man who is deeply versed in history and whose imagination has been kindled thereby. Dor.
