Court of Revision.

The first sitting of the Court of Revision
of the Township of Artemesia for
1894, was held in the Town Hall Flesher-
ton, on Monday the 4th day of June
1894. Present Messrs. Boland, McMillan,
Kells, Best and Thompson.

After each member had subscribed and
made the presented oath as such member
before the Clerk, the Court opened, when
the following appeals were tried and de-
cided:

Wm. Carter appealed against his as-
sessment as being too high on lots 122
and 123, 3rd con. N. E. T. and S. Road.

Pliny Loucks appealed against his as-
sessment on lots 145 and 146, 2 N. E. T.
and S. Road and grist mill too high.

Thomas Hill appealed against his as-
sessment in personal property as being
too high.

Alex. McCabe appealed against his as-
sessment on lots 25, 1st S. D. R. and 1,
2, 3, 1st N. D. R. as being too high.

Joseph McCormack appealed against
his assessment on lots 4 and 5 Block E
Flesherton as being too high.

J. and J. Nash appealed against their
assessment on lots 132, 3, S. W. T. and
S. Rd. and E₂, 4 con. 6, as being too
high.

Peter Holman appealed against his
assessment on lots 3 to 10, Block H, and
Block V, Flesherton, as being too high.

Aaron Teeter appealed against his
assessment on lots 136 and 137, 2 N. E. T.
and S. Rd., as being too high.

George and Thomas Hutchinson ap-
pealed against their assessment on lots 206,
207, 208, 209, 2nd N. E. T. & S. R., as
the number of acres of cleared land being
too much.

John McLeod appealed against his as-
sessment on lot 7, con. 5, as being too
high.

John Martin appealed against his as-
sessment on N. half lot 35, con. 14, as
being too high.

Wm. Carter's assessment be reduced
fifty dollars on lot 132, 3 N. E. T. & S.
R. Carried.

Kells—Best—That Pliny Loucks' as-
sessment on lots 145 and 146, 2 E. T. &
S. R., be reduced \$500. Carried.

Kells—McMillan—That Thos. Hill's
assessment on personal property be re-
duced to \$500, he having proved to this
court that that amount only is liable to
assessment. Carried.

Kells—McMillan—That as to Joseph
McCormack's appeal, the assessor's va-
luation be sustained. Carried.

Kells—Best—That the assessment of J.
& J. Nash be sustained. Carried.

Kells—McMillan—That Peter Hol-
man's assessment be sustained. Carried.

Kells—McMillan—That Aaron Teeter's
assessment on lots 136 and 137, 2 N. E.
T. & S. R., be reduced \$100. Carried.

Kells—Thompson—That in the matter
of G. and T. Hutchinson's appeal to number
of acres cleared be corrected, but the
valuation of the assessor be sustained.
Carried.

Kells—McMillan—That John McLeod's
assessment on lot 7, con. 5, be reduced
\$200. Carried.

Thompson—Best—That John Martin's
assessment on lot N₁ 35 con. 14, be re-
duced \$50. Carried.

The following changes were made to

\$2100, instead of \$400, as shown by roll.

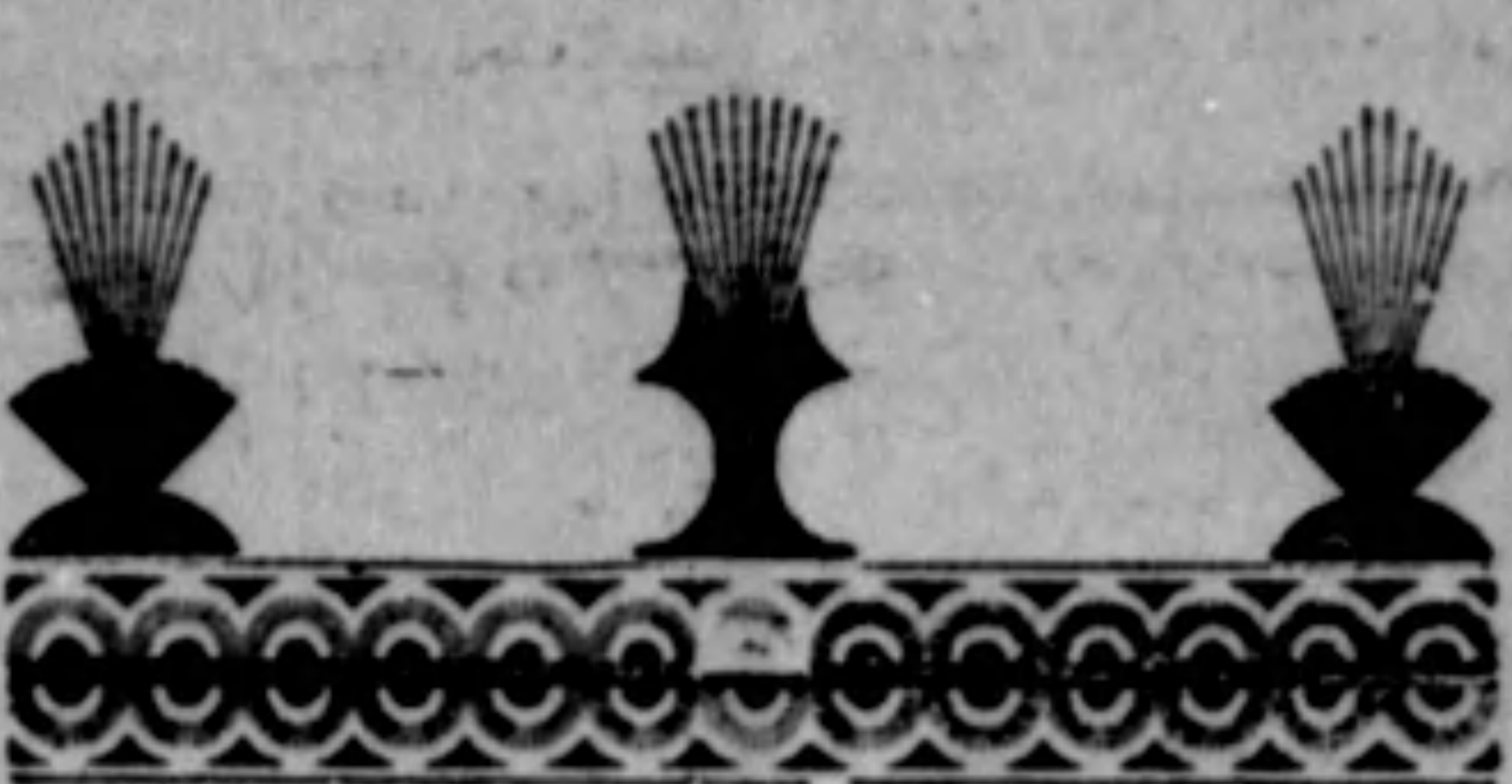
