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**To Wnship Council**

The Municipal Council of the township of Artemesia, met in the Town Hall, Flesherton, on Monday, June 4th, 1894, after the adjournment of the Court of Revision, for despatch of business. Members all present. The Reeve in the chair.

The minutes of last session were read and confirmed.

A petition from Isaac Sinclair, Pliny Loucks, et al re bridge and culverts on back line, east, was presented and read.

A letter and bill from Wm. Galbreath, for damages to vehicle and harness on town line Artemesia and Glenelg through defective crossing, was read.

John C. Adams wanted hill on back line west, at lot 153, repaired so as he could build fence.

John Lyons wanted a grant to repair road on south line and 130th side road.

Archie Neilson wanted a grant to open up base line north from town line Artemesia and Proton.

Irwin Fawcett waited upon the Council in regard to opening town line Artemesia and Osprey, north from 12th con.

George Irwin wanted a grant to open up part of base line west, south from 170 side road.

George Binnie waited upon the Council in reference to repairing approaches to bridge and ditches on 180 side road w.

Thos. Gilbert asked the Council to notify parties to remove fences off the road at deviation at lot 139, 3, N. E. T. & S. R.

Thos. Butler wanted a grant, to base line north from Flesherton Station. This matter was referred to the Commissioners.

Thos. Genoe wanted a grant on tenth concession, at lots 32 and 33.

Jonathan Hicling waited upon the Council in reference to hogs and other stock running at large on roads.

John A. Black wanted a grant on 2nd con. N. D. R. at lots 25 and 26.

A letter from Wm. Gibson, Esq., M.P. acknowledging receipt of petition and resolution of Council re ocean freights on cattle shipped to Great Britain.

Kells—McMillan—That the Clerk notify Messrs. George Stewart and John McLean to move their fences clear of road allowance on deviation on lot 139, con. 3, N. E. T. & S. R. said fences to be removed by the first day of November. Carried.

Kells—McMillan—That whereas John C. Adams complains that some years ago the commissioner of ward No. 3, undermined his fence on back line west, and he has suffered considerable damage by said action and now claims redress, therefore be it resolved that this matter be referred to the commissioner of ward No. 3, he to report at next meeting of Council or if necessary, to take immediate action in order to make matters right. Carried.

Best—Thompson—That the culvert at lot 152, back line west, be repaired or rebuilt as the commissioner of Ward No. 3 may deem necessary, and that a special grant sufficient therefor be made. Carried.

McMillan—Kells—That Thomas Conkey be appointed overseer in Pricerville instead of Jas. Brander resigned and the bylaw appointing officers be amended accordingly. Carried.

Thompson—Kells—That the petition of Isaac Sinclair, et al, be referred to commissioner of Ward No. 3. Carried.

McMillan—Best—That the application of A. Neilson re opening part of base line north from township of Proton be entertained and a special grant of fifty dollars be made for the purpose, if necessary, and that commissioners of Wards 1 and 3 attend to the same. Carried.

Best—Thompson—That commissioner of Ward 3, repair the approaches to bridge on 180 side road west, and ten dollars be expended in gravelling said side road. Carried.

McMillan—Kells—That in reference to the application of John Lyons, fifteen dollars be granted to improve south line where stated and 180 side road third west. Carried.

Best—McMillan—The commissioners Wards 1 and 3 examine the road referred to in the application of Mr. Irwin and if found necessary twenty dollars be expended in improving said road. Carried.

Thompson—Best—That this Council grant twenty dollars to be expended on tenth concession at lots 32 and 33, provided the commissioner of Ward No. 4, expend an equal amount out of his ward appropriation. Carried.

Kells—Thompson—That twenty-five dollars be granted to improve the valley

road south of Campbell's deviation, lot 24, con. 12. Carried.

Thompson—Best—That the petition of J. R. Hogget al presented to this Council at its last session and laid over, be entertained and twenty dollars be expended in gravelling the road as asked in said petition, viz., Meaford Road, north of Eugenia. Carried.

Kells—Thompson—That the petition of John I. Graham heretofore presented to this Council and laid over from time to time, be now entertained, and that a grant of fifty dollars be made to be expended in making the deviation of road asked for in said petition, viz., on the 12 concession at lot 22 and 23. Carried.

Thompson—Best—That a sum equal to ten dollars per mile be expended on the gravel roads in repairing the same, to be expended by the various road commissioners in their several wards according to number of miles in each ward and where most required. Carried.

McMillan—Best—That this Council grant fifteen dollars to be expended on con. 2, N. D. R., near lots 26 and 27, on condition that the commissioner of Ward No. 1, expend an equivalent sum out of his ward appropriation at same place. Carried.

Thompson—McMillan—That the road commissioners of 1893, be paid twelve dollars each, being commission on ward appropriation. Carried.

Kells—McMillan—That the statute labor divisions of Pricerville and Flesherton be advanced amount of their respective commuted statute labor therein until same is collected. Carried.

Kells—Thompson—That Wm. Galbreath be paid \$2.25 in full of Artemesia portion of damages to vehicle and harness by accident on town line Artemesia and Glenelg, caused by defective culvert on road. Carried.

The Council adjourned to meet June 30.
