How the light is spreading. Think of dear, peaceful old Flesherton being stirred up by the "woman question." It is the sign of the times that this question is everywhere. But I am becoming too reminiscent, or I could recall our later triumphs under the somewhat democratic government of the laconic and taciturn McMaster—struggles and triumphs in Algebra and Geometry, when we had all, regardless of sex, an opportunity for drawing on the board those mystical circles and angles, and for searching for that diabolical unknown quantity, which masquerading as the inoffensive and useful little x, continued to evade our most ardent search.

Like your man friend, I, too, am a little tired of the woman question and sometimes in my indolence wish there were no questions in the world. But that question is here to stay and the most patent evidence of it is, that that astute old politician, Oliver Mowat, is betaking himself to what he knows will be the winning side. He has not been a politician all these years for nothing. For good or evil, the ballot must be given to women. It is the inexorable logic of our age. Step by step they have fought for their right, first to work, next for higher education, next into the professions and finally it will be to the polls. Even in as many years I have seen men take these four steps to conversion. The man who last year opposes a girl earning her own living will this year, having had to cede that position, oppose her entrance to the University or a medical course. Failing to keep his footing there and learning nothing from the history of the past, he will next take up the cudgels against her entering the legal profession. From that position also he has been driven and is

next seen in his role of dullard, opposing her enfranchisement.

Only the other day a Welsh university set the world the example of conferring upon a woman the degree of Doctor of Music. Such long-withheld and grudgingly-given laurels should make every man blush for his sex. Away with such petty jealousy and let us see some of that generosity so natural to man, but which has been hidden away so long as to make some doubt its very existence.

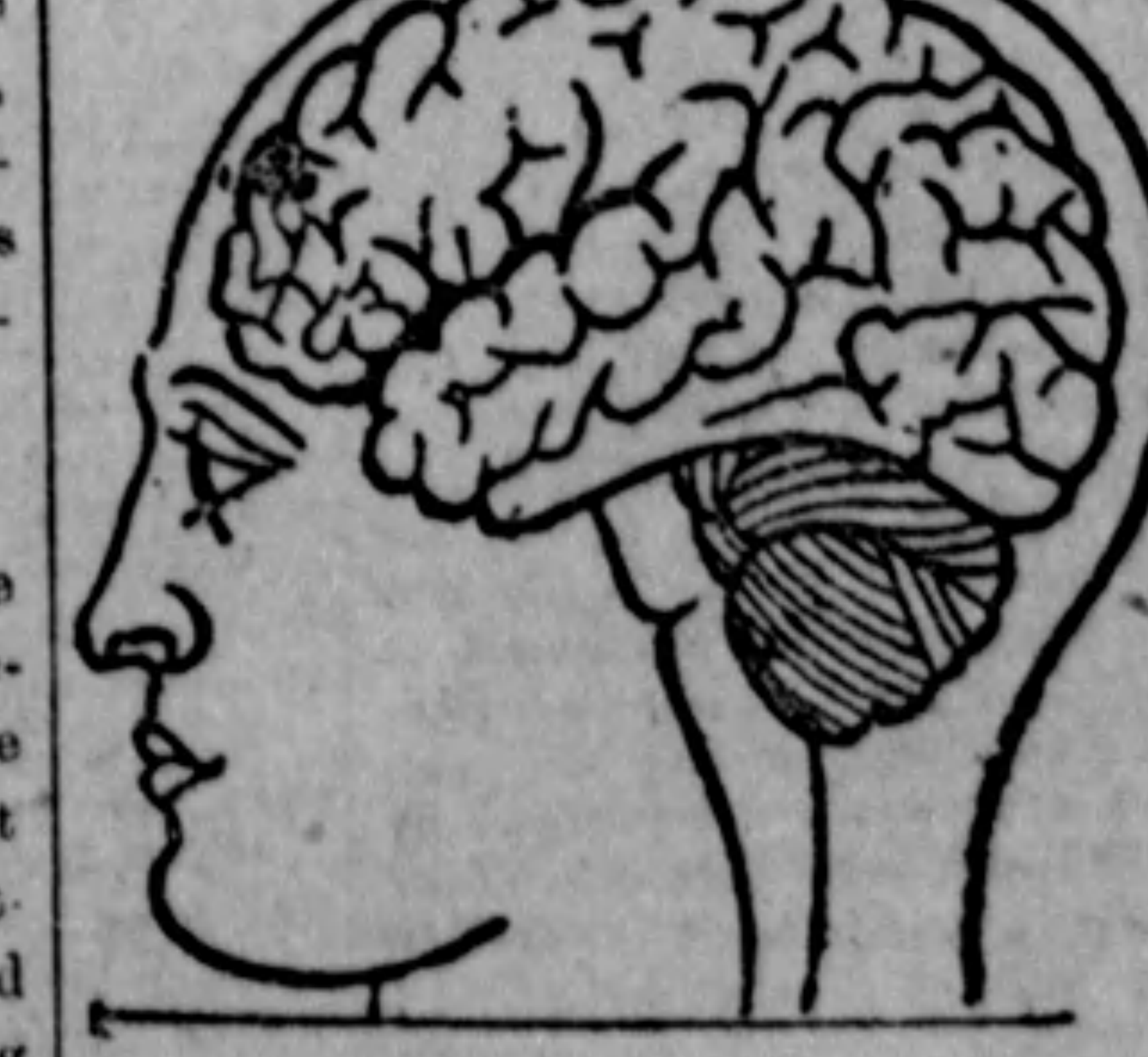
