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THE NOMINATION.

At precisely 10 o'clock on Tuesday Sheriff Moore and Geo. Ingles, Clerk of the Court, Owen Sound, took their seats in the Town Hall and requested nominations for legislative candidates for Centre Grey. The following nominations took place:

Major Rorke was nominated by Mr. W. McLoughrey and Mr. M. Richardson; Thos. Gamey, Esq., by Mr. W. Hames and Mr. Jas. Robinson; and C. W. Hartman, Esq., by Mr. Jas. Patterson and Mr. Caleb Clayton.

At 2 p.m. a public meeting was convened at which all the candidates spoke and others. The hall was completely packed with electors. Mr. Wm. Lucas, of Markdale, occupied the chair. The crowded condition of our columns prevents anything like a synopsis of the speeches. It will have to suffice to say that the large gathering was very orderly and gave each of the gentlemen a patient and interested hearing.

The political meeting in the interest of C. W. Hartman, was fairly well attended, the majority being Conservatives and Patrons. C. W. was the first speaker and he set forth the manifold virtues of the Mowat Government in half-an-hour. He was followed by Mr. J. Davis, in the interest of the Patron candidate, Mr. Gamey, in a humorous but effective speech of three quarters of an hour. Like Mr. Davis, he was in hot pursuit of the government on various grounds. He remarked that the only persons deriving benefit from the Toronto Government were the active political heelers in its interest. One "worker for the party" who supervised the construction of colonization roads received such amounts as \$237 to the workmen's \$119.

Dr. Coulter spoke in the interest of C. W. Hartman for an hour and a half. The Dr. is an able and eloquent speaker and although the hour was late, he held the closest attention of the audience. As was before mentioned Mr. J. R. Hogg made a most efficient chairman.

Rev. Mr. Perry preached his farewell sermon last Sunday here to a crowded house. He took an appropriate text from Heb. 12, Chap. 1. Mr. Perry was regarded with the deepest respect and affection here and sorrow pervades the community at his departure.

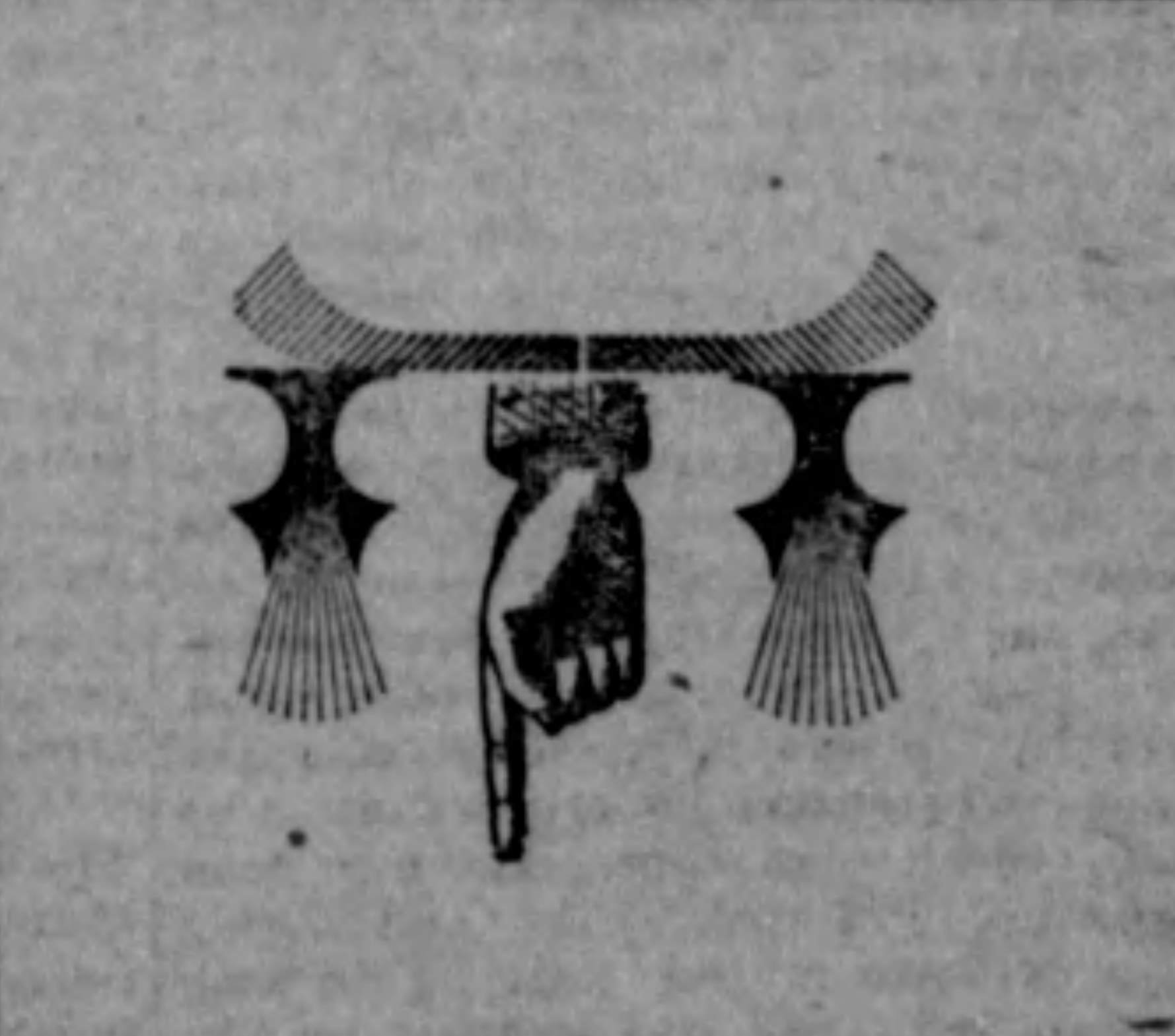
