County Court.

Concluded from last week.

Bowerman vs. Price.—This was an action for damages on a bond and was undefended. The plaintiff resides in Artemesia and the defendant in Toronto. After hearing evidence as to the damage, His Honor Judge Creaser directed judgment to be entered for the plaintiff for \$200.19 and costs. Lucas & Wright for plaintiff.

Cannington vs. Bruce.—This was an appeal by defendant from magistrate's conviction. The conviction was quashed by consent. Masson & Evans for appellant, Lucas & Wright for respondent.

Rumley vs. Rumley.—Was another appeal from magistrate's conviction. The parties reside in Meaford. The appeal was sustained and conviction quashed. MacKay and Hatton for appellant.

True bills were found in the following cases by the Grand Jury: Queen vs. Adam Holley, Theft; Queen vs. Grieve, Assault.

Queen vs. Clark—Felonious wounding. In this case a true bill was found at the December sittings, 1893. The defendant in the action was Ira Clark, charged with assaulting Donald Peter McCrae. Both parties come from near Thornbury. A. G. MacKay for Crown, Jas. Masson, Q. C., and T. H. Dye, of Thornbury, for prisoner. Verdict, not guilty, the jury pronouncing the assault justifiable, unexcessive and committed in self-defence.

Queen vs. Holley.—The parties come from near Markdale. The prisoner was accused of stealing a quantity of clothing from one Hadon, a man who had previously been convicted of committing an indecent assault on Holley's wife. After hearing considerable evidence His Honor took the case from the jury and discharged the prisoner. A. G. MacKay for the crown, Lucas & Wright for the prisoner.

Queen vs. Grieve.—Assault. H. G. Tucker moved on behalf of the defendant to traverse the case to the next sittings of the court. Motion granted.

The Grand Jury made their presentation Thursday morning, in which they expressed gratification at the small amount of crime in the county, agreed with Judge Creaser's suggestion that the hour for opening court should hereafter be 2 o'clock, and spoke in terms of satisfaction of their visit to the jail, the hospital and the College Institute. They were then discharged by the judge. Court rose Thursday afternoon.
