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The great railway strike in the United States is still gaining in strength and its results are far-reaching. Even Canada is feeling its effects. The complete railway system of the western states is paralyzed, and an immense amount of perishable freight has been destroyed through inability to move it. Mob law held Chicago in its grasp on Friday and Saturday, but the military succeeded in quieting the disturbance to a certain extent, but not until a large number of lives were sacrificed and an immeasurable amount of damage was done to railway property. This is the most bitterly fought strike the United States has seen. The amount of suffering and losses to property entailed thereby cannot be computed. Mr. Pullman was an employer of labor. He reduced the wages of his men 50 per cent. and they quit work. Thus far they were perfectly justified, but when it comes to destroying property and thoroughly demoralizing the general business of the country in order to coerce Mr. Pullman, that is exceeding all bounds and in the emergency these men have only themselves to blame for being classed as rioters and subverters of the peace, and their treatment accordingly by the militia is only justice.

The Patrons of Industry have much cause for rejoicing at the result of the recent elections. This society claims to be not makers or breakers of governments, but simply a band to enforce economical legislation which they conceive to be in the best interests of the country. They are now in a position to demand with a reasonable hope of success all that they can desire. They hold the balance of power in the Legislature, just what they have aimed at, and find themselves even stronger than they anticipated. It will be strange if the next session of the Ontario Legislature does not witness Sir Oliver backing water with a long oar in order to avoid a fatal collision with the Patron ship. He will forget his antipathy to the election of county officials, the doing away with government house, and many other little things which Mr. Meridith and the Patrons have decided must be done, and he will come down like a little man with everything asked for. Of course he will do it with a long lip, but he will do it.

The writer left Flesherton at 6 a. m. on Friday, June 29, himself and wheel consigned to Port Perry on lake Scugog, in the township of Reach. The day was very hot. The route was via Shelburne, Alliston, where dinner was partaken of, thence to Cooktown, Bond Head, Bradford, and Newmarket, east to Uxbridge, putting up there for the night about 8.45, after having travelled a distance of 101 miles. Next morning Port Perry was made after a short run of ten miles. Then came four days of fishing and an excursion on Scugog to Washburn's Island, a beautiful resort at the south end of the lake. From Port Perry a run was made to Lindsay, and an excursion enjoyed down Scugog river and Sturgeon lake to Bobcaygeon and Sturgeon Point by the popular little steamer Crandella, Capt. Crandell, Mate Lewis Winter, of St. Vincent Township, to meet whom seemed like discovering a friend from home. Sturgeon Point is one of the most popular summer resorts north of Toronto, and at present most of the cottages are filled with the "exodusters" from cities and towns, from far and near. Bobcaygeon is a rugged, rocky, picturesque and busy place, also a summer resort of considerable prominence, but more particularly known as the pasture field of Bro. Smif, of the Bobcaygeon Independent, who supplies all the humor and pathos that is consumed by the natives, through his widely-quoted journal.

From Lindsay a run was made to Woodville, where we met and were royally entertained by friend Evans, formerly of Flesherton, and his good lady. We were much pleased to find that Mr. Evans is doing a good trade and enjoying life. He is also a disciple of the wheel and became our escort as far as Beaverton, on Lake Simcoe. From Beaverton to Orillia was a nice, level run. Crossing the Narrows to Orillia we found one of prettiest towns of which Canada can boast. We fell in love with it. Situated on Lake Couchiching, on rising ground, nearly every homestead commands a beautiful view across Lake Couchiching, which is dotted with handsome islands inviting boating and picnics. It is the ideal home for a summer vacation. W. A. Sherwood, one of our clever Canadian poets, has written the following exquisite lines:

Long since the red men named thee Couchiching,  
Or built his wigwam rude upon thy shore;  
But longer after shall the minstrel sing

At 8.10 a. m. on Saturday morning last we tore ourselves reluctantly away from busy Orillia and pretty Couchiching. The roads were heavy after rain, and sandy, which made travelling difficult. The route from there home lay through Hillsdale, Elmvalle, the Nottawasaga and Stayner. Home was reached on Saturday night an hour or so after dark, making a ride that day of 75 miles over very slow and difficult roads. The week's outing was valuable in many ways.
