The U.P.B.A's Celebrate.
AN ORDERLY CROWD AND A PLEASANT DAY.

The U.P.B.A. celebration on Monday last may be considered a very successful affair, taking the busy season into consideration. There was a representation from every Orange lodge in the district as well as the young men, but not a full representation. Harvesting operations prevented this. The crowd in town was a large one nevertheless, and the day was thoroughly enjoyable. Flesherton band headed the procession, followed by the amalgamated lodges. After a sumptuous dinner had been partaken of at the Town Hall or at Mrs. Thompson's booth, an adjournment was made to Flesher's park, where a platform had been prepared. The speakers of the day were Rev. Mr. Jones, of Maxwell, Rev. Mr. Madill, of Sarnia, and Rev. Mr. Wells, of Flesherton, in the order named. Dr. Scott, of Maxwell, occupied the chair, and in a short speech explained and extolled the objects of the order, and also replied to our request of last week to explain why the day was celebrated on August 12 instead of July 28. His explanation was as follows: While the supplies of Kirke's vessels arrived in Derry on July 28, King James' army beleaguered the city four days more and only took their departure on August 1. This was the actual day of relief. Then in the year 1752 the Gregorian calendar was adopted, which dropped eleven days from the old order of time, and brought the day of celebration to the 12th. This explanation is eminently satisfactory.

Curiosity had drawn many to hear the P.P.A. champion, Mr. Madill, who is a fluent and pleasing speaker. His utterances were somewhat wild and exaggerated, but interspersed with anecdotes and good natured railery against the existing order of things, which alternately tickled and disgusted those present. As a result he was not loudly applauded at any time and there was much conflict of opinion upon the merits of his address. One gentleman in our hearing designated it as "flap doodle," whatever that may mean.

Revs. Jones and Wells gave two solid, sensible addresses, after which the gathering dispersed.

The town was handsomely decorated with evergreens and flags for the occasion. Flesherton U.P.B.A. is now in a flourishing condition, enjoying a membership of 49.

The crowd was very orderly and everything passed off quite pleasantly.

The ladies of the Methodist church added about fifty dollars to the funds by giving a hot dinner and supper in the Town Hall.
