Burglary at Clarksburg.
On Thursday night of last week Hartman's bank at Clarksburg was broken into and the vault blown open with nitroglycerine. 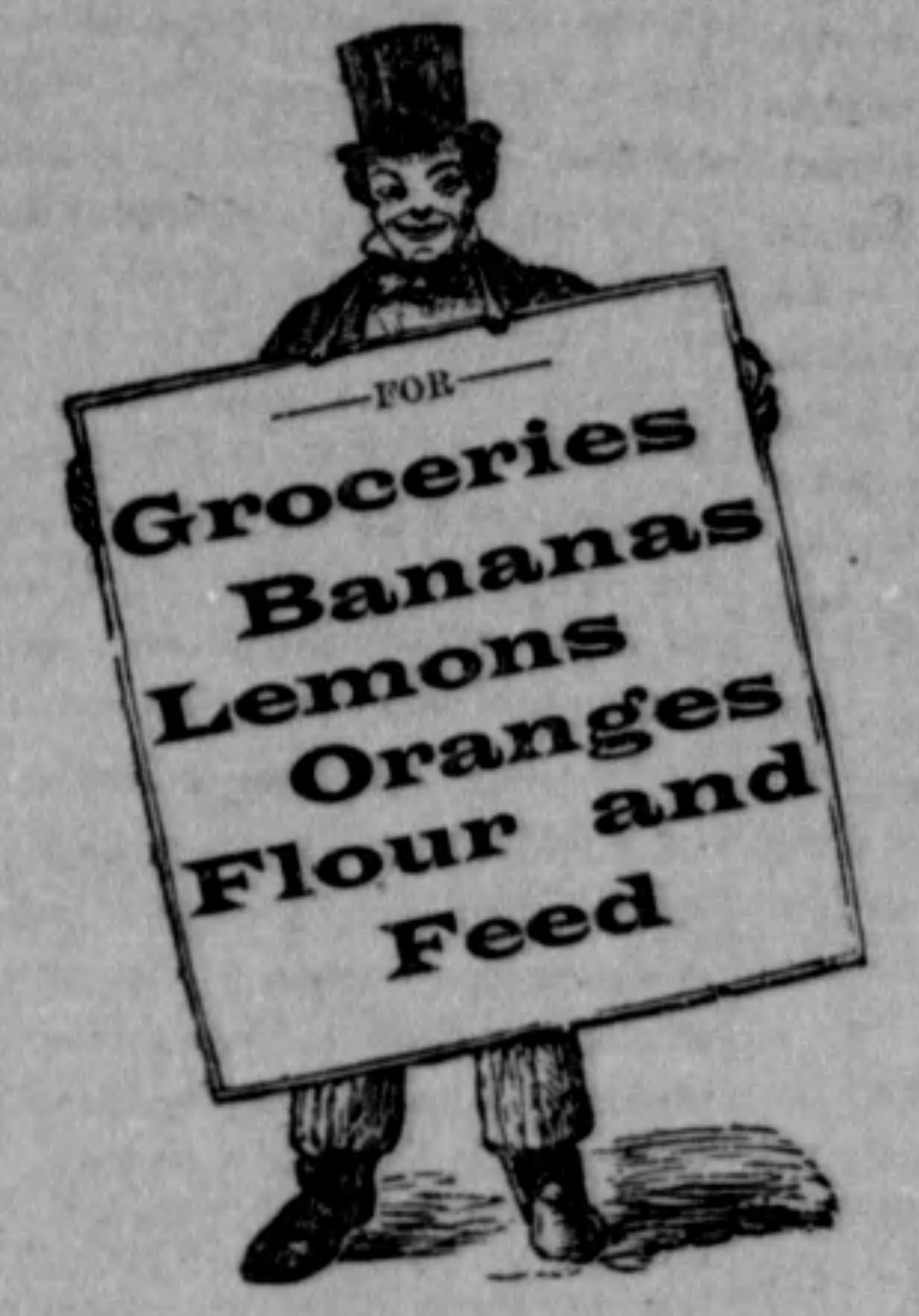
