McCullough and Young's Bank Tapped for \$900.

THE THIEVES DO A SLICK JOB AND GET AWAY WITH THE GREATEST EASE IMAGINABLE—HOW IT WAS DONE.

Messrs. McCullough & Young, of Markdale, built a handsome new bank building last year, which has not, however, proven burglar proof. On Sunday night or early Monday morning burglars entered their building by a rear window and proceeded scientifically to extract all the lucre contained in the safe. They had first provided themselves with tools from a neighboring blacksmith shop and a robe and a rope from a livery stable to deaden the sound. The handles of the vault door were broken off and an entrance to the safe made in that way. The safe was a small one. This they dissected by breaking off the door handle and introducing the explosive at that point. The safe was badly shattered, after which the marauders emptied the cash box of its contents, in the neighborhood of \$900, and decamped. Mr. McCullough knew nothing of the transaction until he came down town at 9 a. m. when the ruins met his gaze. To a reporter of The Advance, who called upon him on Tuesday, he appeared to take the matter quite philosophically, remarking, "It is only nine month's profits gone, and all I can do is to get to work and make the money over again."

Two young men who slept in the drug store next door affirm that they heard the explosion, and also heard two whistles as of some one signalling, but they gave no alarm. A heavy thunder storm was in progress while the work was being done, which accounts in a measure for the ease with which the thieves succeeded in their operations. There is absolutely no clue to the perpetrators, but whoever they were they thoroughly understand the business in which they are engaged.

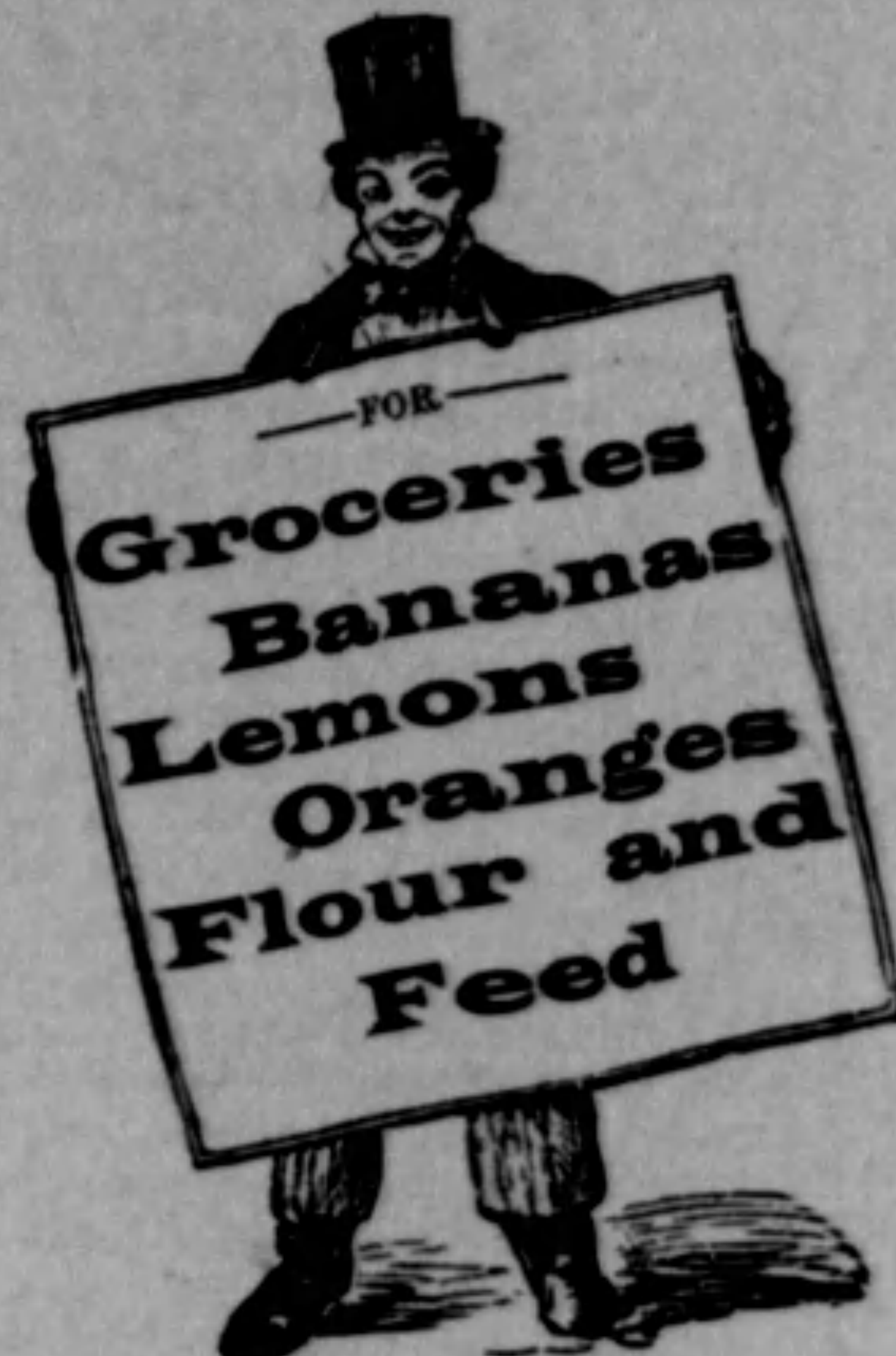
