Buried in a Well.

The Hanover Post gives the following
thrilling facts: The water in Mr. B.
Ahrens's well gave out and he engaged
G. Barton to sink the well lower and
find water. The first twelve feet were
protected by a wooden crib, somewhat
decayed, and the remaining six feet were
bricked up. On Monday morning work
began, and between ten and eleven
o'clock most of the brick had been re-
moved, when without warning the old
crib gave way and the earth and sand
caved in and completely covered Barton,
who was standing erect at the time. Mr.
Ahrens, who was at the top of the well,
slid down the rope to the rescue and at
the same time called to Mrs. Ahrens, sit-
ting on the door step a few feet away,
to run for help. Ahrens found that
sand to the depth of six or seven inches
covered the head of the unfortunate man.
He pulled the sand away with his hands
but almost as fast as he scraped it away
it filled up again. With the energy of
despair he worked away and soon had
Barton's head uncovered, but notwith-
standing the utmost exertion he could
not keep the sand away and the man was
buried again and again. When help ar-
rived Ahrens was up to his waist in sand.
A board was lowered and it was thought
that his face might be kept clear, but it
failed. A sheet of tin was then tried
and was more successful. Barton, who
appeared to be the most collected of the
lot, advised that a crib be made and low-
ered over him or he would never be taken
out alive. After 80 minutes of hard
work the crib was made and lowered and
the danger was past. A lot of hard work
still remained as the crib was not large
enough to permit a shovel to be used,
and the sand had to be lifted out with
a small scoop. About three o'clock a suf-
ficient quantity had been removed, so
that a rope was fastened around him and
he was drawn out and had a glimpse of
the sun, which he but a short time be-
fore never expected to see again.
