Township Council.

Artemesia Township Council met in the town hall on Monday of last week, 1st inst. All the members present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of previous meeting read and confirmed. The following communications were received: From the clerk of Proton, re supplemental grant; from Thos. Sullivan, re expenditure on town line Artemesia and Glenelg.

Bylaw 405, appointing a township engineer under the statute, was introduced and passed.

Kells—McMillen—That the collectors appointed to collect the rates of ward No. 2 and ward No. 4 be notified to furnish necessary bonds for the same and submit them to the reeve on the ninth day of this month at the village of Flesherton. Carried.

Best—Thompson—That the clerk notify Mr. Thomas H. Taylor, who, we have been credibly informed, is filling up water course with stones opposite lot 128, to remove said stones at once from road allowance, as the commissioners of ward 3 and 4 have expended public money on opening up said ditches. Carried.

Best—McMillen—That the reeve and deputy reeve be and are hereby appointed a committee to meet the reeve and deputy reeve of Glenelg, to confer with them regarding the alleged claim of John O'Hearn, re compensation for road allowance at or near Irish Lake, said committee to report to this council at their next meeting. Carried.

Kells—Best—That the commissioner of ward 2 in concert with commissioner, Thos. Williscroft, Esq., councillor of Holland township, proceed to repair town line Holland and Artemesia, leading N. E., from T. & S. road, each municipality to pay one half, cost to be as little as possible, and that commissioner of ward 3 be and is hereby instructed to have the stones removed off Collingwood road between the village of Flesherton and 25th side road, Con. 6. Carried.

Thompson—McMillen—That the reeve be allowed five per cent. on total cost of Eugenia bridge for services in connection therewith, including plans and superintending the same, to be paid out of county grant. Carried.

Best—Kells—That this council cannot accept Mr. T. Sullivan's statement as correct in every particular, as T. Kells, commissioner ward 2, expended in 1892 on town line, known as Miller's swamp, south of Markdale, \$11, and in 1894, repairing culvert where Mr. Galbreath broke his buggy (in Miller's swamp, \$2, total, \$13. This, according to Mr. Sullivan's own statement, leaves \$10.14 due Artemesia, and further, Mr. Kells spent in 1891 \$24 graveling on town line between 110th side road and corporation of Markdale, this leaving due Artemesia \$34, a copy of this resolution to be sent Glenelg council. Carried.

Kells—Thompson—That this council is not prepared to make any further grant to town line Artemesia and Proton at present, and that Proton council be notified to that effect. Carried.

Kells—Thompson—That D. McMillan, commissioner of ward 1, be paid for special work as follows: Town line, Proton and Artemesia, 3 days, \$3; base line at Proton station, 1 day, \$2; 3 days on con. 3, N. D. R., \$3; 1 day to Irish Lake, \$2; total, \$10. Carried.

McMillan—Kells—That Geo. Thompson, commissioner ward 4, be paid for special work as follows: 2 days on town line Artemesia and Osprey, \$4; 2 days on 30 sideroad, \$4; 1 day on Beaver river bridge, \$1; 1 day on 30th sideroad, repairing bridge over Beaver river, \$1; total, \$10. Carried.

McMillan—Best—That commissioner of ward 1 attend to having a culvert put on con. 3, opposite lot 16, N. D. R., and also to have culvert on D. R., con. 1, opposite lot 31, repaired. Carried.

Thompson—Best—That the commissioners of ward 3 and 4 have the bridge on 70 side road repaired, as the same is unsafe for public travel. Carried.

Thompson—Best—That Geo. Saul be paid the sum of \$2.50 for damages done to buggy by defect in bridge on 25th sideroad. Carried.

Kells—McMillan—That John McGee, be paid \$2 for repairing bridge over Saugan creek, lot 17, con. 11, and culvert near same place, and that Richard Watson be paid \$4 for repairing culvert, lot 100, con. 2nd east, and that Andrew Graham be paid \$1.25 for repairing causeway at Beaver river, lot 13, con. 12. Carried.

McMillan—Best—That Alexander McLeod be paid \$3 for repairing culvert on side road 10, N. D. R. Carried.

Council adjourned.
