Mrs. Gilray, wife of Mr. Robert Gilray, J. P., who was reported so ill at last writing, passed to her rest on Wednesday the 10th inst., at the age of 78 years. Deceased was a native of Blair Athol, Perthshire, Scotland, where she lived until after her marriage. The funeral took place on Friday the 12th, to Thornbury and was largely attended. Rev. J. F. McLaren, of Temple Hill church, conducted a short service at the house, and preached the funeral sermon on Sunday evening last at Temple Hill. The deceased leaves an aged husband and a family of six sons and five daughters to mourn her loss, to whom the sympathy of the community is extended.

The Osprey farmers' mill is doing a rushing business just now.

We had quite a fall of snow Saturday and Sunday, but it is all gone now.

We had two interments on Sunday in this neighborhood. One, Mrs. Edward Hanley, who died on Friday after a lingering illness with cancer, and Mr. Thos. Saigeon, who died on Friday after a short illness of inflammation of the lungs. Mr. Saigeon was an old and respected resident of the township of Osprey, having moved to Osprey from King township among the early settlers and resided on lot 24, con. 10, until his demise. He leaves behind a large family consisting of five daughters and three sons, to mourn the loss of a father. They have the sympathy of the whole community in their sad bereavement.

George feels very proud of the successful career he has had during the present season's fairs with his celebrated running horse, King James, having attended five exhibitions with the following results: Clarksburg, taking 1st prize and being a general favorite on the ground, Walters Falls, holding a good position and beating some of the best horses in that part; Meaford, taking 2nd prize and beating the best horses in that part of the county; Shelburne, gained the greatest victory of all, taking first prize easily from the celebrated Ravenshill and Jaquet of Dundalk, and we understand would have distanced them had there been a distance post placed on the track, and this victory was of great opposition. Dundalk, King James was entered again against the same horses, Ravenshill and Jaquet, and won first heat easily, in second heat he was jockeyed off the track, and third heat he met with the misfortune of getting his bridle

broken a few rods from starting and run the full course without a bridle taking an easy second and his rider trying his best to stop him.

Eugenia

From our own correspondent.

There is a dearth of great events in our little city just now, still it is doubtful if there are many places where more discussion takes place as to past, present and future. We ever and anon hear of new enterprises in project which will place Eugenia in its allotted place in the community of cities. One has come and evaporated in smoke, leaving but the blackness of soot to mark its existence. But still we do not despair, but are still buoyed up with, we hope, no delusive hopes.

The discovery made upon Mr. Duckett's place and surroundings seems to be budding into a reality. The marl, 95% pure, and not 9% as incorrectly stated in your last issue, is said to be exceptionally pure, and is certainly valuable as an important ingredient in cement. Mr. Meldrum has received some important information re the manufacture of cement from Mr. R. J. Doyle, the proprietor of the cement works at Shallow Lake. The material there extends over a space of 600 acres, from 12 to 15 feet in depth, or an estimate of 15,000,000 tons. Mr. Doyle states there are more than 100 small deposits in Canada, but not of sufficient magnitude to warrant setting up works, which, according to the lowest estimate would cost \$15,000. Mr. Duckett informs us that marl is found scores of feet deep and extends over a large area. He is persuaded that the other earths such as 61% silicate of which is necessary to enter into combination, are to be found as well. Efforts are being made which will result in more definite information soon.

Mr. Hanna, of Kimberley, has been engaged as successor of Mr. Johnson, who resigned some time ago, at a salary of \$380, including sweeping and fire lighting. This is a reduction of \$35.

A young Mr. Williams has arrived at Mr. Jos. Williams', and Joe is smiling.

The Eugenia F. B. C. played a picked team from Maxwell, Feversham and Rob Roy, which resulted in a draw. It was a swift game.

The proceeds of the harvest home on the 15th inst. was \$27.75, which testified that the annual gathering is about or as popular as ever.

County and District.

Mr. Frank Henman, owner of the trading schooner, "Lady of the Lakes," had an experience last Saturday evening which he will not soon forget. As he was making for Thornbury on the way from Parry Sound his boat was caught by the storm about 10.30 o'clock. The masts were blown completely off, causing the boat to upset. Mr. Henman, with great presence of mind, grabbed a rope belonging to the rigging, and adjusting it about his person, tied himself to the boat. For hours he floundered in the water, the waves sweeping over him like huge mountains. It was near daybreak Sunday morning when the boat, with Mr. Henman in tow, drifted ashore near Delphi.—Mirror.

James Thompson, who was arrested on a charge of arson in setting fire to the Owen Sound Cement Co.'s buildings at Shallow Lake, came up for hearing before Geo. Price, J. P., yesterday afternoon in Mr. Price's office. Considerable evidence was given, none of which was very strong against the prisoner. The magistrate decided, however, to send the case up for trial.—Times.

The proprietor of the Queen's Hotel, Warton, was fined \$20 for breaking the liquor license act, and R. Abraham was fined \$8.50 for asking for liquor, knowing that the hotels had been notified not to give him any.

Twelve hogs, belonging to Jas. Dowd, Chateworth, died mysteriously last week. It is thought they were poisoned and an investigation is in progress. Mr. Dowd's pigs will amount to about \$144.
