Died—On Monday, 22nd inst., Ferguson Wright, aged 74 years and 3 mos. The deceased was born in the county of Down, Ireland. He was educated for an English Church clergyman, but instead of entering the pulpit he turned his attention to school teaching, his first attempt being in one of the schools on the estate of Col. Ford, county of Down. He was married to his now sorrowing widow, nee Elizabeth Bennett, in the year 1845. He emigrated to America in 1849, landing in New York. He taught school in N. Y. State for a year and in Pennsylvania 5 years. He afterwards came to Ontario and taught school at Derry West, Streetsville, Ash Grove and Milton. In 1862 he moved to this county where he continued teaching until old age prevented him from pursuing that calling any further. All through life he was a student, especially of Mathematical subjects. In geometry we venture to say he had no peer in this county or even in the province. The following son and daughters survive him: Miss Wright and Mrs. Dr. Hutton, of Priceville, Miss Jane Wright, teacher in Victoria Co.; Mr. Sam. Wright, of Hamilton; Mrs. Tuck, of Lindsay; and Mrs. Paton, of London.
