A bran elevator was at work, and in playing near it young Himsworth accidentally fell into the hopper. The machinery was stopped as soon as possible, but a great deal of bran had fallen on him, and

although he was taken out alive and medical assistance summoned, so much bran had been taken into his lungs that he died the same night.
