The laws of Ontario provide that any person taking up stray stock shall give notice of such taking up by publishing a notice three times in a weekly newspaper, if one is published within the section where the stray is taken up; and if the property is not called for within three weeks after the first insertion of the notice the finder will go before a justice of the peace and take oath to the finding and advertising. If the property is not claimed within one year and should not exceed \$50 in value it then belongs to the party taking the same up; if over \$50 it shall be advertised by the justice and sold, and the excess of all expenses shall be paid over to the county treasurer. Any person taking up an estray and neglecting to cause the same to be advertised and appraised shall be liable to a fine of \$20. The estray law applies also to any other personal property which may be found in a like manner.

A Mystery. Geo. McNichol, a young man aged about 28 years, son of Mr. Jas. McNichol, west back line Aramesia, was found in a field on Saturday last with his throat cut. Dr. Wells, of Markdale, was summoned, and is attending him. A mystery is made of the affair and those acquainted with the facts will not talk. The young man, who is a stonemason, worked in Michigan for three years, returning home a few weeks ago. It is supposed to be a case of attempted suicide.
