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Hobbs (Ref.) was elected in London on Tuesday to fill the vacancy in the Legislature caused by the resignation of Mr. Meredith. Hobbs' majority was large.

It is pretty nearly time that municipal matters were beginning to engage the attention, and yet everything is as calm as though the election was a year ahead of us. We have heard no rumor whatever, but as none of the old council have announced their intention of retiring it is likely they will all be in the field.

The Russians have been having a terrible time getting their late Czar laid away in his tomb. The exertions extended over a period of seventeen days from the time he died, and the ceremonies cost the country an enormous sum of money. The new Czar will be married in a few days, and it will no doubt take a couple of weeks of palavering, with a corresponding cost, to get his royal pots and pans in their proper place, while feasting and rejoicing succeed mourning in quick order. The Russians appear to delight in rushing from one extreme to another.

The citizens of Toronto are now discussing the question of what they shall do with the poor. Rev. Dr. Langtry proposes that monied men purchase a block of land a few miles from the city, cut it into five acre lots, build houses thereon and rent them for just sufficient to pay the interest. Numerous other proposals have been made but none that could be unanimously adopted. This question of late years has assumed a serious phase in most of our large Canadian cities, and appears to become more serious year by year. The coming winter promises to be exceptionally severe in this respect, and public charities will be more than taxed to their utmost. The principal cause of this appears to be the great influx from rural districts to the already congested centres of industry, resulting in deprivation, hardship and poverty. There has been a too steady inflow from the farms and villages of the country without a corresponding expansion of the rural population. Millions of acres of good agricultural and stock raising ground are lying barren in Canada while farmers' sons hie them off to the cities to labor as hod carriers, street car drivers and laborers, at a small and unstable salary, where they might utilize these untilled acres and be comparatively independent, at the same time leaving for those who do not understand farming, the work for which they are most fitted. There appears to be a fatherly desire among many farmers that their sons should not undergo the hardships which they themselves suffered in their pioneer days and rather encourage them to seek for something easier. So long as this sentiment continues congestion of the trades and suffering will remain questions for the philanthropists to struggle with without solution.

From our own correspondent.
The deer season is over and yet according to report there are a good many deer yet in our own neighborhood. These will have a lease of life for at least another year. Deer hunting possesses a wonderful attraction for sportsmen, and it is not unnatural. Capturing these swift quadrupeds, with their acute sense and wariness, calls out the best abilities of hunters; the quickness and accuracy of the marksman is developed from necessity in an eminent degree. Very rarely, unless the shifty deer be deceived by circumstances or manoeuvres, will the gunner get a deer shot. Personally I am not sorry that the timid and almost harmless deer can evade the skill of the hunter. Their peculiar nature beget in us a sort of affection for them. If they did not afford us such genuine sport they might go their way unmolested, except when the selfish stomach demands a piece of venison. It is strange that we will leave such animals as the coon and ground hog to their own trouble in adjacent woods, and spend time and money and labor (for it is really manual labor in the disguise of sport) to capture a Muskoka deer. If the animals that infest our own woods afforded us the same pleasure they would have been long since dead and so would that fleet-footed and beautiful creature—the deer—if it were not for the protection with which the law surrounds it, were it not for this the sportsman would find a great hole in his source of pleasure and he, too, supports the law that gives this rightful protection. Outside of our most favorite domestic animals, the deer excites our greatest admiration from his beauty, his fleetness, his timidity, and lack of ultrawild animal instincts.

It is rumored about again that the hoop and veneer business, of unsavory fame, is about to restart under different conditions. Several unsuccessful efforts have been made by the past firm to get it back into their hands, but fortunately for the public in this part of the world, failed. In this instance failure was most desirable, as the way in which business was formerly conducted was a standing and life long reproach to the authors.

The new bridge is now a fast and substantial public work. It is a good successor to the rickety and tottering affair that formerly marked the spot. The raise of four feet and the levelling up to that height has greatly facilitated travel. J. E. Williams stuck very steady to the filling in on the lower side. A tremendous amount of clay, stone (principally) and gravel was required in the filling up by actual measurement, amounting to nearly 1,600 cubic yards. Mr. Carr has some little work to do yet on the north end. It strikes a good many of us that the amount for the work is not at all commensurate with the work done, especially when the bridge costs about \$700. Proportionate to the whole work the filling up should at least be \$300. Taking the filling on the lower side, the pay as now rated only make 5 cents a cubic yd.

A great many people are wisely removing stone from their places, so you see we are generally speaking a go-ahead community. Messrs. Hogg, H. Bowerman, A. Smith, F. T. Carr, have had the services of Mr. Wallace Armstrong, with his stone machine. Mr. Hoy was also employed here in the same work.

Mr. John Williams has placed a new stone foundation under his barn, James and Wallie Williams, with the assistance of H. Fenwick, did the work.

Mr. H. Meldrum has received some winter plants from his sister in Scotland, who resides in the home of his birth in the town of Dunfermline. This is a pleasant memorial of one's early life. Mr. Meldrum spent many years in active business in a large manufacturing establishment in his native town.
