County and District.

Dundalk has a new ice rink.

The curfew bylaw of Collingwood is a failure.

Watson's livery stable, Beeton, was burned last week. \$500 on contents.

W. T. Saunders, of Durham, dropped dead a week ago Thursday, aged 78 years.

The new cement works at Shallow Lake, destroyed by fire, are again in full blast.

Jas. H. Little, proprietor of the Owen Sound Advertiser, lost his only son by scarlet fever last week—a bright little fellow five years of age.

A keen observer has said that Mr. Moody resembles a trolley car in getting his power from above. Another point of similarity is in the fact that both draw crowds.

Last Sunday night the barn on the premises occupied by Mr. Rich. Barnby, owned by Mr. A. D. Thompson, near Corbetton, was destroyed by fire, together with eleven head of cattle, a number of fowls, about fifteen tons of hay, and 400 or 500 bushels of grain. We understand there was an insurance of \$500 on the building and \$500 on contents. The fire is said to have been started by sparks from the chimney on the house.—Economist.
