Toronto the good is in deep mourn-  
ing for herself, and incidentally for  
her worldly-minded aldermen, who  
have been using their position to ex-  
tort private donations from city con-  
tractors. The good people of that  
city have a dim idea that these private  
donations come out of their own  
pockets in a roundabout way, and are  
taking the matter into their most seri-  
ous consideration. Three or four  
aldermen and ex-aldermen have thus  
far been convicted of sin

There is a town not many miles  
from Flesherton where nearly every-  
thing appears to be run on political  
lines. For instance, there is a Con-  
servative and a Reform doctor, a  
Conservative and a Reform lawyer, do.  
bank, do. hotel, do. druggist, etc., etc.  
The churches and public school have  
not yet divided, but this will no  
doubt come in due time when the  
wealth of the citizens will permit.  
The identification of the town is un-  
necessary; it is the absurdity of the  
situation which we wish to draw at-  
tention to. The young people of that  
town will either become extreme par-  
tisans, or what is probably more nat-  
ural imbibe an abhorrence of politics  
of all kinds.

**County Council.**

County Council met in Owen Sound  
last week. Clerk Rutherford opened the  
session and called for nominations for  
warden. Reeve Pringle, of Sullivan, was  
unanimously chosen.

In his opening address the warden said  
he hardly knew how to express his grati-  
tude for the great honor the council had  
done him. He had neither expected or  
sought the position. He felt very in-  
capable, but as a former warden had put  
it, those who had voted him to the posi-  
tion had not done so to leave him, but  
would remain his staunch friends and  
give him all the assistance possible. It  
was the first time in the history of his  
township that the honor of the wardenship  
had been conferred on its represen-  
tative, and on behalf of the township he  
thanked them. He regretted deeply the  
cause of the position having to be filled.  
The late warden had been a very dear  
friend of his, always easy to approach for  
advice or favor, and of kindly disposition.  
There was not a member of the council  
who felt the loss more keenly. It was a  
solemn warning to those present that  
within the year the council had been  
called upon to fill two of its most im-  
portant positions through the ravages of  
death. He hoped to be sustained and  
assisted in the county's business by the  
council's hearty co-operation.

The clerk announced that since the last  
session the old messenger, Mr. John  
Mills, had passed over to the silent ma-  
jority. He read a letter from Mrs.  
Saddler, a daughter of Mr. Mills, asking  
that the second half year's salary be paid  
to her. A number of other communica-  
tions and accounts were presented as  
follows: Statement from Meaford cor-  
poration showing cost of new steel bridge  
over Big Head river to be \$2,163.72; and  
asking that \$500, the county's share, be  
paid over; statements of the county  
treasurer on indigent, stationary, ped-  
dlars and auctioneers' license accounts;  
copy of agreement between the warden  
and Mr. Legraw for the adoption of the  
child of Ann Buchanan, an indigent,  
which was born in the goal, by which on

the payment of \$100 by the county, Le-  
graw maintains the child until it is 16  
years of age; accounts from Copp Clark  
Co., \$8.50; and G.N.T. Telegraph Co.,  
50c.

On Wednesday afternoon the second  
meeting of the session opened at 2  
o'clock, with the warden in the chair.  
After the reading of the minutes of the  
previous meeting and the presentation  
of a number of accounts, the reeve of  
Artemesia introduced a bylaw to confirm  
Bylaw 510 of the township of Artemesia,  
to close a portion of a sideroad in that  
township. The bylaw was read a first  
and second time.

The council then entered upon a dis-  
cussion of a motion by Messrs. Stuart  
and Davis to appoint a committee to wait  
upon the county treasurer to ascertain  
the amount of salary, fees and commis-  
sion he received. The motion was op-  
posed by leading members of the council,  
while others supported it for the purpose  
of securing the information and not with  
an idea of reduction. All of the mem-  
bers eulogized Mr. Parker's ability. An  
amendment by Reeve Brown of Durham  
requesting Mr. Parker to furnish a state-  
ment of the fees and commissions re-  
ceived during 1892-3, carried, after the  
warden had announced that Mr. Parker  
had requested the privilege of coming  
before the council to make a statement.  
The council then adjourned until two  
o'clock this afternoon.—Times.
