Priceville.

The tea meeting in the Presbyterian church last Wednesday evening was one of the best ever held in Priceville. Everything went off grandly from the first cup of tea to the last speech. The Durham choir furnished music of a high order for the occasion. The speakers of the evening were the Revs. Messrs. Hartley of Priceville, Harrison of Dundalk, Dr. McRobbie of Shelburne, and Messrs. Eiley and D. McLean of Priceville, P. McGregor of Dundalk and Chas. Ramage of Durham. The chair was occupied by Mr. John McArthur in his usual urbane manner. Proceeds nearly \$47.
